Friday 20th July Last day of term All of our Year 11 GCSE students have began their written examinations this week. This is also the examination period for our Key Stage 3 students. You may also have a younger child sitting his/her SATs. These are demanding and stressful times for our young people, and relationships at home may well be tense. We are all doing our best to ensure that the experience is well managed and calm.

On Tuesday, Ms Prieto and staff accompanied a group of eighty Year 9 Spanish students to participate in a special film and language study day at the BFI IMAX in Waterloo. On Monday afternoon the Performing Arts Faculty hosted a workshop from the Old Vic in preparation for a trip to the Old Vic on Tuesday evening to see a performance of the world premiere production of a new play "Mood Music" about life behind the scenes in the music industry. The Performing Arts Faculty has also been busy this week with technical rehearsals, organised by Ms Cornford and Ms Wallace, in preparation for the Year 10 Drama students' examination performances on Wednesday and Thursday. Ms Wood will be taking a group of Year 10 sports leaders to the Feel Good Centre on Friday afternoon, where our students will develop their leadership skills. Also on Friday, the Year 10 students participating in this year's Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme will do a practice expedition to Gilwell Park in readiness for their forthcoming award expedition later in the term.

Congratulations to the Year 8 netball team, who have won another match, this time against Highams Park School, with a final score of 7-1. Well done to *Grace* (our Captain - 8G), *Sylvie*, *Jessica* and *Rebeca* (8F), *Molly* (8G), *Morenike* and Deja (8H), *Jessica* (8W) and the player of the match, *Roya* (8W).

You may recall that in Greensheet on 3<sup>rd</sup> May you received information on a consultation for redeveloping the St Mary's Church site next to the school. We do have some concerns regarding the planning proposals that have been submitted, particularly for the three storey building which will overlook the school's grounds and impact on privacy and potentially on security of the school. I would therefore encourage parents and carers to look closely at the proposals and if you share concerns then please highlight them to Waltham Forest Council by responding to the consultation. Please see p3 for further details.

The **consultation will close on 31**<sup>st</sup> **May**, but this has been extended from the original so please submit any responses as soon as possible.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish all Muslim members of the school community a peaceful and happy Ramadan.

#### St Mary's Churchyard Land Redevelopment

You may be aware of redevelopment plans for St. Marys Churchyard land which shares a boundary with us at the rear of the school. A planning application has been lodged with the council for the new development and can be viewed at: <a href="http://planning.walthamforest.gov.uk/">http://planning.walthamforest.gov.uk/</a> by searching for the planning application: 180314.

Whilst the school is delighted that there will be investment and development of community buildings in our locality as well as housing for key workers, there are a number of issues we would be seeking reassurances on, such as the additional height of the new residential development of fourteen flats overlooking our outdoor spaces where students play and socialise, possible security implications due to easier access to our grounds from intruders and the disruption the building works may cause to the operation of the school. We would welcome parents' and carers' comments on the application.
