A huge thank you from all of us to Marion Dowling who has compiled the content of the site over a period of months and will also be overseeing it. Please take some time to browse through the area for parents and carers and let us know your thoughts for improvement. You will see that there are still some areas under development but these will be completed by the start of the next academic year. It was lovely to chat to some of our Year 7 parents on Thursday at our Year 7 GREEN celebration- and to hear their very favourable comments.

'Our business' continues and I am sure I haven't been able to keep up with it all - although I have tried! Monday was our superb Summer Musical Concert, the last under the stewardship of our outgoing Head of Performing Arts, Michael Burstow. He is relocating back with his family to Devon and will be sorely missed. I will update you on our other staffing changes in September. The soloist, ensemble and orchestral pieces with vocal accompaniment were wonderful. The second half was notable for the noise of our steel pan bands alongside the biggest orchestra I have yet to see at WSFG - led powerfully by *Kalila's* singing, in a novel interpretation of *Run* by Snow Patrol and *One Day Like This* by Elbow.





This week, all Year 8 students have been on a truly memorable outward bound trip to the Young Mariners' centre in Hertfordshire. Thank you to Ms Famiglietti and Ms Jean Baptiste and the Year 8 tutors who have accompanied the trips - and got very wet themselves! I was also privileged to be one of the judges of the Year 8 Public Speaking competition. The speakers spoke so very maturely and confidently to their whole year group on a range of topics: including child brides, the bee crisis, social media, discrimination, cosmetic surgery and mental health. Congratulations to Zia, Eliza, Imaan, Amira, Khadijah and Crystal whose speeches were all so powerful and persuasive, and a special well done to Khadijah 8C who was the overall winner - but it was a very hard decision. Thank you also to Ms Cato and the English team for organising the event.

Other activities this week have included careers educational trips to the City and commercial businesses for Year 9 students, a trip to Wimbledon as a reward for our students who were members of the ball-crew in the Wheelchair Masters event and, for Year 7, our third GREEN event which took place in the grounds in

Information for Parents/Carers

Dear Parents / Carers,

It has been brought to my attention that a number of students in various Year Groups throughout the school have head lice at the present time. At school we are not entitled to make any head inspections, nor would we wish to, so the responsibility for treating head lice lies with the Parents / Carers.

There is more information contained within this Greensheet. It suggests how to treat the problem if it occurs. If you suspect your daughter has head lice, must be treated systematically and the full instructions on the treatment lotion must be followed until she is completely clear. If some of the eggs remain, she will continue to have lice as they do breed quickly. The lice and eggs may take a number of treatment sessions to eradicate. The recommendation is that the whole family is treated at the same time as head lice are very easily passed on. Recommendations about the best lotions and treatments can be made by your chemist or pharmacist.

If your daughter does have head lice and she is being treated for them, there is no reason to keep her away from school, but it would be useful for you to inform us so that we are aware.

Diversity Workshops Review



Year 8 and Year 9 students were lucky to participate in Diversity workshops last week. The aim of those workshops was to give our students an opportunity to engage with issues around sexual orientation and gender identity in a safe and open environment. The key

messages were ones of kindness, respect and equality. In our school we want students to feel free to express themselves and feel valued for their uniqueness.

We listened to LGBT volunteer role models whose powerful stories gave an insight in to the experiences of LGBT people. A Q&A followed which helped develop students' empathy, understanding and acceptance and challenge stereotypes and prejudice. Here are their views:

School Uniform September 2017/8

Dear Parents / Carers and Students,

We are very proud of our school uniform at WSFG and we wish to ensure that all students and their families are clear about the high expectations that we have in terms of the standard of dress that is expected for school. The WSFG uniform is very versatile and students have a number of choices of uniform items.

Please ensure that if you are purchasing new items of uniform that they are of the permitted styles. The recommended suppliers stock the correct accepted items of uniform. Any items that are not listed below are not acceptable for school and you will be asked to change the item for one that is within the uniform rules.

Please note carefully the guidelines on shoes and outdoor coats which have been clarified for September 2017. Also please note that your daughter will not be allowed to wear noticeable make-up that is not minimal or discreet. False nails or false eyelashes are also not allowed for school.

If you have any queries or questions about uniform for September 2017, please contact your daughter's Progress Leader.

The compulsory uniform consists of:

Dark, bottle green pleated knee length skirt or trousers in the acceptable school styles below:

• Dark, bottle green religious dress in plain, cotton fabric.

- Strictly no jeans style trousers, tight trousers or leggings are permitted.
- Plain white blouse with shirt collar to be worn by all. Shirts can be long sleeved or short sleeved.
- Plain white vest top can be worn under the school shirt if necessary.
- Dark, bottle green sweater, cardigan or sweatshirt without any logo.
 No other colours of sweater or cardigan are permitted.
- Plain black, white or bottle green knee socks, ankle socks or tights are to be worn at all times. Over the knee socks are not permitted.
- Plain black low-heeled sensible shoes or boots. Trainers and higher heels are not permitted. Footwear must have black laces and not have pattern, colour or large branded logos.
- Plain, black coat or jacket that is suitably waterproof. Denim, leather, faux leather jackets and hoodies are not permitted to be worn to or from school, or in school.
- Hijabs must be plain white or dark bottle green with no fringe and must be worn pinned securely.
- School blazer with WSFG logo (see above) is **compulsory** for Years 7 and 8. This must be worn at all times. The blazer is **optional** for Years 9 -11.

Uniform Extras:

- Facial coverings are not permitted to be worn in school and if worn to
 or from school, must be removed once the student enters the school gate.
- Make-up, if worn, must be minimal and discreet. False eyelashes, eyelash extensions, acrylic or other types of nail extensions are not permitted.
- Students are permitted to wear one small stud in each ear (which should be
 no bigger than the size of a pea) and a wrist watch only. Facial piercings and
 visible body piercings (including tongue piercings) are not permitted. Any
 other jewellery items will be confiscated and will only be returned to
 parents / carers.
- Hair must be of a natural colour and hair of a non-natural colour is not permitted. All hair accessories must be small, discreet and plain.
- Coloured or patterned contact lenses are not permitted.
- The school reserves the right to ask a student who is not in correct uniform to remove non-uniform items or change into uniform items provided by the school for the day.
- The school does not accept any responsibility for the loss or damage of any confiscated items.



INCREDIBLE YEARS PROGRAMME

A parenting skills training programme for **adoptive families** developed by Coram and based on the Webster-Stratton Incredible Years programme. It takes account of adoptive families' particular needs and circumstances.

The programme aims to:

- -Strengthen parenting competencies by focussing on positive behaviour strategies (positive discipline, confidence, etc.);
- -Improve the parent-child relationship through the development of trust and secure attachments;
- -Provides shared learning with partners (if a couple) and peer group and gain peer support:
- Increase parents' involvement in children's school experiences in order to promote children's academic, social and emotional competencies and reduce conduct problems.

Course structure

The programme will run over a period of 12 weeks, each session lasting 2 hours and 15 minutes. There will be a follow-up session approximately 6 months later to review progress. The course is suitable for parents of children in the primary age range, 3 to 10 years of age.

There is no charge for attending and a crèche is provided.

Prevention and Treatment of HEAD LICE

Detection Treatments

Head lice are well camouflaged and hide when disturbed by combing.

They do not always cause itching, particularly when recently arrived on the head. They may also be few in number and a quick inspection is unlikely to detect them. The following method of detection is effective:

- Wash the hair using ordinary shampoo, then use a wide toothed comb to straighten and untangle the hair. It is easier to do this with wet hair, and using hair conditioner
- Once the comb moves freely through the hair, without dragging, switch to a fine tooth comb. Make sure the teeth of the comb slot into the hair at the roots and draw down to the ends of the hair with every stroke. The comb must be fine enough to catch the lice size indicated below – do not confuse lice or their eggs with clumps of dandruff or other debris.



- Check the comb for lice after each stroke as you work through the hair section by section, so that the whole head of hair is combed through, then rinse out the conditioner and
- repeat the combing procedure in the wet hair.
- This can be undertaken on a regular basis eg. At routine hair washing sessions to detect
 the presence of lice before they can spread. Check all family members at the same time
 and arrange treatment when lice are found

Treatment

If you find lice, then there are two options. Whichever option you choose it is important to recognise that neither will protect against re-infection if head to head contact is made with someone with head lice at a later date. You may therefore wish to undertake occasional checks during hair washing sessions.

Option 1: Lotions and creme rinses using insecticides

- Do not use lotions or rinses unless you find a living moving louse. Check all close family/friends by the "wet combing" method, as described, and treat anyone who is found to have lice at the same time, to prevent re-infection.
- Ensure you have enough lotion/rinse to treat all those affected and follow the
 instructions on the packet carefully, eg. as to how long the treatment must remain
 on the hair to be effective, how often you may apply the product etc.
- The product may be capable of killing eggs, as well as lice, but there is no certainty of

this. Check for baby lice hatching out from eggs 3-5 days after you use it, and again at 10-12 days.

• If the lice appear to be unaffected by the product (some lice may have developed resistance to a particular insecticide) or if the problem persists - then you should take advice from your local school nurse, health visitor, pharmacist or GP, who will be able to advise you on alternative treatments and explain how to use these to best effect. You should seek advice where whoever is being treated is either Under 1 year of age, suffers from asthma or allergies, or is pregnant or breast feeding.

Option 2: The "Bug Busting" treatment method

This aims at systematic removal of live lice by combing through the hair and physically removing any lice found. Success depends largely upon adopting a painstaking approach - as described in the "Bug Buster" kit. The kit, which includes an illustrated guide and combs, is available from some pharmacies, and by mail order from:

- Only one kit is required for a family and it is reusable. Four sessions spaced over 2 weeks
 are required to clear the lice, as long as the person does not catch more lice, in which case
 half-weekly sessions must continue.
- Some schools find it helpful to adopt a whole-school approach (where all parents check
 their children and family members on the same evening and treat as needed), A "Bug
 Buster" Teaching Pack is available to assist this process. For further information send three
 2nd class stamps loose, plus a self-addressed sticky label to the above address.
- Taking part on "Bug Busting" days can help to prevent lice circulating, ie. if all cases are
 identified and treated successfully at the same time there will be fewer opportunities for
 lice to circulate amongst children and their families.

Facts

- Head lice are small, six-legged wingless insects, pin-head size when they hatch, less than
 match-head size when fully grown and grey/brown in colour. They are difficult to detect in
 dry hair even when the head is closely inspected. They very often cause itching, but this is
 not always the case, particularly when recently arrived on the head.
- Head lice cannot fly, jump or swim, but spread by clambering from head to head. Anyone
 with hair can catch them, but-children who have head to head contact, either at school
 or during play, are most commonly affected.

- Head lice feed by biting and sucking blood through the scalp of their host. The female louse lays eggs in sacs (nits) which are very small, dull in colour, and well camouflaged. These are securely glued to hairs where the warmth of the scalp will hatch them out in 7-10 days. Empty egg sacs are white and shiny and may be found further along the hair shaft as the hair grows out. Lice take 6-14 days to become fully grown, after which they are capable of reproduction.
- Head lice are not fussy about hair length or condition. Clean hair is therefore no
 protection, although regular (eg. weekly) hair washing .and combing sessions offer a good
 opportunity to detect head lice, and arrange treatment if discovered.

Head Lice

Lice hang on tight to the hair, usually close to the scalp where there is warmth, food and shelter from detection. Full grown lice take the opportunity to move from head to head during close contact. Younger lice tend to remain for about 6 days on the head where they have hatched.

Head lice need to maintain contact with a host in order to survive. Those lice that leave the host voluntarily, or fall off, are likely to be damaged or approaching death (their life span is about 3 weeks) and so unable to start a new colony. There is no need to wash or fumigate clothing or bedding that comes into contact with head lice.
