This follows on well from the Leadership Assembly last week on Perspective following the death earlier this month of the art critic John Berger. This gave us an opportunity to share with the girls the wonderful paintings of Vincent Van Gogh as well as explore the risks attached to manipulating images via social media.	

We are planning to hold an **information evening** for you after half term on **safeguarding** and the risks attached to social media, so watch out for details nearer the time.

Our **sports teams** have been making us all very proud. The Year 7 football team won their first three games last week; 6-0 against Kelmscott, 2-2 against Lammas and 2-0 against Heathcote. Congratulations to all team members! This week our Year 9 and 10 Volleyball teams are competing in the Borough Volleyball competition. We wish them every success.

We are very pleased at WSFG to have once again achieved some of the highest levels of attainment and progress in our **2016 examination results**.

In the new **Progress 8 performance measure**, which measures value added in student progress over eight subjects, our students' overall score of **+0.63** places us in the **top 3% of schools nationally** (ranked 76th). When compared also against the new **Attainment 8 measure**, the school is ranked 54th in the country. This is a superb achievement for a non-selective comprehensive. 80% of our students achieved a C grade in both English and mathematics, 48% achieved the English Baccalaureate which represented 73% of those students eligible. The number of A* and As achieved was extremely high with 30% of total entries achieving A*/A grades. The DFE has produced a helpful You Tube video for parents and carers to explain Progress 8 and the new measures:

Olive Dining Cashless Catering



Dear Parents and Carers,

A reminder to parents/carers that if you wish to pay for your daughter's school meals by cheque, please make the cheque payable to 'Olive Dining Ltd'.

All students have also been given usernames and passwords to enable payments to be made online via our SQUID system (see the school website for details).

Please do not hesitate to contact us via the school directly if you have any questions.

Below are a few frequently asked questions:

How does it work?

Your "one card" is similar to an Oyster card whereby you top up with the amount of money you require in order to pay for your school meals. You take your card to the till and place it on the card reader.

How do I top up my card?

You can either top up by a cheque made payable to "Olive Dining" and place it in the box in the Dining Hall before 8.45am each day, or by cash by using the cashloader machine in the student entrance or Dining Hall before 8.45 am, at breaktime, lunchtime or after 3.30pm.

How quickly will the money show on my account?

All cheques will be loaded by morning break. Any top ups made via the cashloader machine will show instantly on your account.

How much can I spend?

The school will automatically put a $\pounds 5$ daily limit (inc. free school meal allowance) on your card. However, parents will be asked if they wish to change this.

What do I do if I forget my card?

You will need to go to Student Services for a slip and then join the back of the queue. You then give your slip in at the till and your balance will be debited

manually. Your card will be automatically updated when you next use it. Do not go to the till unless you have a card or a slip because you will be turned away, cash will not be accepted.

What do I do if I lose my card?

You will have to go to Student Services where new card will be ordered which you will incur a charge of $\pounds 2$. The balance on your account will transfer to your new card.

What if I don't have enough money on my card?

Credit options are **not** offered so it is important that you keep your card topped up.

What happens if I am on free school meals?

Details of free school meals will be loaded onto the system by Student Services so all you need to do is place your card on the card reader. The system will allow you a meal deal option for £1.95 but of course you can top up your card with cash or cheque to supplement this if you wish, for use at breakfast, break and lunch time. It is essential that you keep your free school meal entitlement up to date and you will be sent reminders via the school and the Local Authority. Please make sure that you have a school meal every day.

What happens if my free school meal is not showing on my account? It may be that your free school meal entitlement has expired. You will need to go to the school office to check.

I have an allergy – will the system show if I am purchasing an item I shouldn't?

Yes, we can put details of allergies into the system under various titles.

Can my parents see what I have bought over a period of time? Yes, daily reports are available.

At Christmas the School enjoyed a delightful Nativity play by U.3S. and the usual carols. A gallant band of choristers went carol singing in Rectory Road one evening, and collected money amid the bouring rain and an air-raid siren.

In the Summer Term the normal routine was abruptly shattered by the Flying Bombs. Despite these, however, lessons in the corridors were not only successful, but also very much enjoyed. Dinners in the same place were not so popular, but all admired the conduct of the Fifth forms who not only ploughed through their School Certificate Examination in the corridors, but also gave us afterwards amusing and successful performances of Tovarich and the Admirable Crichton. These achievements are all the more significant and praiseworthy in the light of the excellent School Certificate results



The inter-form competitions were again held this year, and even the Tennis was only interrupted by one siren.

The Flying-Bomb necessitated the cancellation of our farming intentions during the summer holidays. There were to have been daily parties to the allotments and the Chingford Isolation Hospital, where we worked so successfully last year.

Certain members of the Upper School enjoyed a short rest from the Flying Bombs when they visited Thaxted in July in order to discuss post- war problems with other schools; also some Upper Fourth girls attended a French Course held at Harrogate in August.

During the present term the School has returned to its normal routine, but the lively temper of the girls has been dimmed in no small degree by the death on September 30th of Miss Cunningham who had only the week before presented us with $\pounds 25$ to spend on a Library chair. She had been with the School since 1918, and had rendered it invaluable service; her death is indeed a sorrowful event for us all.
