Dear Parent/Carer

Walthamstow School for Girls has a vacancy for a parent or carer to serve as a school governor and I hope you will consider putting yourself forward. The term of office is four years but you can step down earlier if you wish. The Governing Body's main tasks are to support the school, ensure that students receive high quality education and plan for future development and improvement.

If you would like to stand as a candidate please complete the reply slip attached and return it to the school no later than Friday 21st October, 2016.

If there is more than one candidate an election will need to be held but this is a straightforward process. All you need to do is write a short paragraph (no more than one hundred words) saying why you want to become a Parent Governor; this will be sent to all parents and carers with a voting paper.

Should there be only one candidate apply then this person will automatically become our Parent Governor.

The work of our governors is very important to the school in key areas such as oversight and development of the ethos and curriculum of the school; well-being of pupils; staff employment and use of resources as well as ensuring that the school maintains its high standards in all areas. You will be asked to attend an (evening) meeting of the Governing Body once (or twice) a term and invited to work on a committee of governors again once (or twice) a term. We hope you will also visit the school occasionally during the day and help in the oversight of an area of the curriculum. We are not looking for any particular expertise but rather common sense and willingness to give some of your time are the important requirements. However, if you have specialist knowledge or relevant experience, do please mention it in your statement. Training will be provided for new governors in the role.

As a school we are always mindful that the Governing Body should reflect the local community that the school serves and members of ethnic minority groups are therefore particularly welcomed on the Governing Body and are encouraged to stand for election as parent governors.

Governors will also be subject to a Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) check under the Police Act 1997, Part V and will be checked against the DfES List 99 of people who are not permitted to work with children.



Information for Parents / Carers Head Lice

Dear Parents / Carers,

It has been brought to my attention that a number of students in various year groups throughout the school have head lice at the present time. At school we are not entitled to make any head inspections, nor would we wish to, so the responsibility for treating head lice lies with parents / carers.

If you suspect your daughter has head lice, they must be treated systematically and the full instructions on the treatment lotion must be followed until she is completely clear. If some of the eggs remain, she will continue to have lice as they do breed quickly. The lice and eggs may take a number of treatment sessions to eradicate. The recommendation is that the whole family is treated at the same time as head lice are very easily passed on.

Recommendations about the best lotions and treatments can be made by your chemist or pharmacist.

If your daughter does have head lice and she is being treated for them, there is no reason to keep her away from school, but it would be useful for you to inform us so that we are aware.


The first English checkpoint test for Year 10 will be on **Monday 17th October.**

Inspiring Women In Maths Conference

On 29th September, eight students from Year 10 had the opportunity to attend a fantastic conference at Imperial College. There were a variety of inspirational female speakers, starting with Rachel Riley from Countdown, a selection of workshops delivered by PhD students and ending with a hugely entertaining talk by Professor Hannah Fry.

Here is some feedback from the participants:

The day was really motivational and inspired me to study maths further. Also, the workshops were very informative. For example, I learnt that if a triangle is drawn on a sphere, the angles no longer add up to 180 degrees! It was also interesting to learn that a degree in maths can lead to so many different careers. One speaker has access to all of the Oyster card touch in/touch out data and analyses travel patterns. She gave us some tips on the best times to travel to avoid the rush.


