Just before half term, we were reviewed by a team from the national Challenge Partners. The team consisted of four senior leaders from good and outstanding schools in London and from the south coast. The colleagues were advised by an experienced Ofsted lead inspector. They examined the school's planning and evaluation paperwork, in addition to carrying out a close analysis of our 2016 GCSE results and current progress data. They also visited lessons, met with senior and middle leaders and examined students' books. At the end of the review, the team, who were all Ofsted inspectors, concluded with an estimated judgement.

I am delighted to tell you that their judgements were extremely positive for the school. For the areas on which they comment, they judged as follows:

#### IWD at WSFG

Here is a small selection from our archives about past pupils who have been high achievers since leaving our school.

Blanche Hewett Headmistress of Walthamstow School for Girls 1890 to 1924



At the age of 26, Blanche Hewett was appointed as Headmistress, the youngest Head in the history of the school.

She took her degree in Cambridge and became the eighth 'Newman Wrangler,' a 1st class honour degree in mathematics.

She believed in the 'austere beauty' of mathematics.

On her retirement after 30 years at the school, she went on a round-the-world trip and many of her stories are included in the 'iris' magazines.

Dr Jill Slay (Abbott) WSFG student 1964-1971

Engineer and Professor for Cybersecurity



Jill and her brother, attended Selwyn Primary School. She remembers spending a lot of time in Hale End Library.

'I owe my whole academic career to WHS in the 60s to 70s -

I was just a working class girl from Chingford - first of my whole family to go to Uni. The teachers of the time just gave us a vision of being those who would the world – especially through technology – and this is what I have tried to do.'

Professor at University of NSW in Australia and Director of Australian Centre for Cybersecurity. She advises and trains the Australian government, police and army on cyber security. Last year she was awarded Australian Cyber Security educator of the year. She has published one book and contributed to many other books and journals in the last 10 years.

Patricia Scotland Baroness Scotland of Asthal, WSFG student 1967—1969 Attorney General for England and Wales 2007 to 2010



Patricia was born in Dominica, and her family emigrated to Walthamstow when she was two years old.

After attending Walthamstow School for Girls, she went to Essex Technical College, Chelmsford, where she obtained a law degree. She was called to the bar at the Middle Temple in 1977, specialising in family law, and was called to the Dominican bar in 1978.

In 1991, she became the first black woman to be appointed a Queen's Counsel. She was appointed Baroness Scotland of Asthal, Oxfordshire in 1997.

In 2005 she was voted one of the 100 Great Black Britons.

She was appointed Secretary-General of the Commonwealth of Nations In March 2016.

Avril Dankworth, 1922-2013 Musician and Teacher	Her mission in life was to "make music fun". After attending our school, Avril attended Hockerill Teacher Training College, the Royal College of Music and Trinity College of Music. She worked as a teacher in various London schools, including Selwyn Primary School. She also travelled the world, lecturing, training teachers and adjudicating. Jazz was a particular musical passion of her family and her brother was John Dankworth, the jazz musician. She was also instrumental in introducing jazz into the school curriculum. In the mid-1960s, she co-founded 'Sing for Pleasure' - a music camp for children aged from 7 to 17, where the only entry requirement was a love of music.
Kate Castle Dancer and Author Attended our school from 1960 until 1965	Kate Castle trained at the Royal Ballet School and was one of just a handful of students selected for the Royal Ballet Company.As a teenager she danced in Sleeping Beauty with the legendary Margot Fonteyn. She also danced alongside Massine and Nureyev, appeared in the films Ragtime and Heaven's Gate and choreographed the TV programme The Winds of War. She said: 'My mother always said that as soon as I could walk I was dancing. She took me to see the ballet Coppelia before I was even old enough to go to school and I was on the edge of my seat.' 'Dancing for me is always a feeling of absolute exhilaration; it's as if I am doing something I was born to do. I love all kinds of dance.' 'I love encouraging people to take up dance and see performances' it's such an expressive art form that can communicate across barriers and boundaries. A mother of five, Kate has also had a successful career as an author, writing books for children about ballet and dance.
Elizabeth (Lizzie) Reid 2000-2005 Volleyball Player Olympic Games 2012	Lizzie first took up volleyball at school, representing London at the Youth Games in 2006. She made her debut for team GB in 2007 and gained the All-American AVCA and NJCAA awards, after a successful 2009/2010 season. She gained a scholarship to attend the University of Georgia, in America, where she played up against the world's top talent in the sport. She was selected to represent GB at the London 2012 Olympic Games in the Women's Indoor Volleyball competition. She spent 6 years preparing for the event. All the players had to make major sacrifices, volleyball had to be their priority every day and each and every one had to keep their one goal "to reach the quarter finals at the London Olympics and to put British volleyball on the world map".
