Year 9 Options Evening Wednesday I Ith January 2017 6-7:30pm

All parents and carers are invited to attend the Options Evening with their daughter on Wednesday 11th January. The evening will begin in the Hewett Hall with a talk that will explain the options choosing process and hopefully answer many of the questions that you may have. Following this introductory talk, there will be an opportunity to talk to teachers about the subjects on offer.

The Options Booklet is available on the school website and outlines each subject that we hope to be able to offer for study in 2017-19 This may be revised as the Department for Education updates its list of qualifications that they consider relevant for students to study. We are also waiting for Ofqual to approve many of the new courses due to be offered for study in 2017.

As previously, all students will study for nine GCSEs in total with four choices to be made. In order to facilitate the choice of option subjects, our careers education programme will be delivered through the year by taking students out of their timetabled lessons to run careers sessions.

As a result of recent and continuing government educational reform, it has been necessary to review and adapt the options offered each year. We will continue to review our offer to students in the years to come in the light of new changes being implemented nationally; however our commitment remains to offer as broad a range of subjects as possible in order to meet the needs and interests of all our students.

Information for Parents/Carers Medical or Dental Appointments

Dear Parents/Carers

As you know the safety of the students is paramount at Walthamstow School for Girls. We have a concern about students signing out of school to attend medical or dental appointments during school time.

Our attendance policy states that unless unavoidable or in emergency circumstances, medical or dental appointments should be made out of school hours.

If your daughter has an unavoidable medical or dental appointment, the school requires that you send in the letter or appointment card as well as an accompanying letter from yourself requesting that your daughter be allowed to leave school.

The school needs to see evidence of the appointment before we allow the student to leave the premises. We will also be "spot checking" by telephoning parents of students who wish to leave the premises to ensure that the appointment is genuine.

I hope you understand that we require this further information to ensure the safety of your daughter at all times.

Information for Parents, Carers of Year 9 Students

GCSE Combined Science and Single Sciences: for study September 2017

Following a review of GCSE Science provision at WSFG and in light of the statutory changes to routes for students studying Science, there will, in future, be two routes for students to follow at GCSE level.

- All students will study a Combined Science GCSE (previously called Double Award)
 as a minimum requirement. Students are awarded 2 GCSEs and study 8 Units in
 Biology, 7 units in Physics and 10 units in Chemistry.
- Some students will be invited to study separate Science GCSEs (previously called Triple Science). Students will be awarded 3 GCSEs and study the same units as combined science however they will include further content within each unit.

The school has moved to this model following consultation with the Science Faculty, Subject and School Leaders and Governors. We have explored the models followed by other schools and this is in line with other schools nationally. We have also sought the views of current Year 11 students and Sixth Form Colleges.

Separate Sciences GCSEs: Criteria

Those students invited to study separate sciences will be expected to be working at Level 7 in order to be able to manage the demands and rigour of the course.

 Students will be invited to sit a separate science assessment test on 26th January (3:30pm) and will need to achieve a Level 7 or above in this test.
 Students who have not achieved a Level 7 in their class assessments but who do achieve a level 7 in the assessment test will be considered to study the separate sciences course.

A letter explaining the content of the test will be given next week to all students who have achieved a Level 6 or above in their December Assessment so that they have an opportunity to sit the assessment test in January. For any student wishing to sit the separate science assessment test, the reply slip for this letter should be returned to Student Services by **Monday 9**th **January 2017**.

Course delivery

Both Combined Science and Separate Sciences will be delivered over 9 lessons a fortnight.

As Separate Sciences will be delivered in the same lesson time as Combined Science, the pace of teaching and learning will be very fast. Students who accept an invitation to study Separate Sciences will need to commit to this fast pace, to additional home-learning, high attendance and an additional compulsory period 6 lesson on a Thursday (3:30-4:30pm).

Our decision to design two science paths is informed by a range of factors:

- Sixth Form Colleges do not require students to have studied the separate sciences (Biology, Chemistry and Physics) to study those subjects at A-level.
- The Combined Award in Science provides a very good preparation for A-levels in Science.
- No Russell Group University requires a student to have studied separate sciences at GCSE level in order to study a Science-based degree.
- In order to pursue a career in medicine, dentistry or pharmacy, students will need to achieve outstanding results in either Combined Science or Separate Sciences to gain places at University for these competitive courses. Students would then need to choose I or 2 Sciences (Chemistry and Biology) at A-level to progress on to one of these courses at University.
- Students who are not working at Level 7 in Year 9 will find it very challenging to achieve the highest grades in Separate Sciences. It would be a much stronger position for a student to achieve two 6 or 7 grades in the Combined Award than three 5 grades in a Separate Award.
- In order to progress to A level Science courses, the requirement is two 6 grades at GCSE.
- A significant number of students in the past, who have taken the triple science course, have requested to move from it because they have found the content very demanding and this has resulted in high levels of anxiety and upset.
- A significant number of Year 11 students have fed back that they believe that there should be a criteria for students to study Separate Sciences because of the heavy demands of the course.
- Science teachers in WSFG feel strongly that many of our students will achieve higher grades studying the combined award than if they pursue separate sciences.

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Year 7 Trip to the Royal Veterinary College

On 14th December, a group of twenty four students from Year 7, Ms Gocool, Ms Kelly and Ms Robinson, had the opportunity to spend the day at the RVC. The college began 250 years ago and back then, all of their trainee vets were men. By 1995, approximately half of their students were female and now, 85 - 90% are female! It was a particularly interesting day as the girls learnt about different courses and careers relating to animals and how to prepare to apply, which GCSEs and A levels to study, and the importance of getting some work experience. They were also invited to participate in a research project of a final year student. Here is some feedback from the girls:

I had a great opportunity to represent the school by going to the Royal Veterinary College. It was a wonderful day and I met two beautiful calves called Coco and Maisie. We had the opportunity to test their heart rate using a stethoscope and to listen to their tummy. Urrgh! It sounded like a washing machine. Fortunately we did all this before they went to the toilet everywhere!

I really enjoyed the day and it has inspired me to meet more animals and maybe to work with animals one day.

The most interesting part of the day for me was taking part in a research project. First we completed a questionnaire. That was the easy part! The hard part was providing a saliva sample as we had to suck a 'stick' of cotton for 60 seconds. It was horrible but we knew it would help Emily with her research. She was measuring our cortisol levels, before and after meeting the animals. The whole point of Emily's research is to find out whether it is better to learn about animals by meeting



them or if it is just as good to read about them in a classroom. I was also one of the lucky two students to wear a GO-PRO. This was for filming our learning experience. After learning about the body and bones of a cow we had to give another saliva sample to compare with the one before. It was a great day, lots of fun, and we are participating in further research on 5^{th} January when Emily visits us at school.


Overall, it was a very inspiring, interesting and educational day. There will be information for Year 10 about an Easter Workshop at the RVC, coming soon.
