Can leave education at 16




You can leave school on the last Friday in June if you'll be 16 by the end of the summer holidays.

You must then do one of the following until you're 18:

stay in full-time education, for example at a college

start an <u>apprenticeship</u> or <u>traineeship</u>

spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training








There is a college course out there for everyone whatever your grades.

This will depend on which level course you wish to study. More information on this to follow.






Your grades are really important and each college will have entry requirements.

However, colleges also look closely at things like:

- Attendance and punctuality
- Exclusions
- Interests and hobbies
- Your involvement in school and community life





Fact

There is no limit to how many colleges you can apply to.

You should ALWAYS apply to several colleges and ALWAYS have a backup plan.

For example, some colleges may accept your enrolment but not offer you the course you want.

KEEP YOUR OPTIONS OPEN

College deadlines vary - some are as early as November and others extend to April/May.

Some colleges also operate on a first come first served basis.

The earlier you apply the better. This also means that your applications are sorted and you can focus on your exams.

Fact

Some colleges may ask you either on an application form or in an interview which other colleges you have applied for. You are under no obligation to inform them. This is your choice!

You may receive several 'conditional' offers. This is absolutely fine. You can make your final decision and accept your place in August.



Sixth forms are better than colleges



Both sixth forms and colleges have pros and cons.

Sixth forms are based in a school and will usually only offer level 3 courses. They will probably also have a dress code or uniform and rules similar to school.

Colleges tend to offer more courses and will also offer a range of level 2 and 3 vocational courses.

College Applications - Information

- At college / sixth form you can study level 1, 2 or 3 courses. Level 3 is the highest. You will need to study level 3 courses to go on to university.
- To study a level 3 course you are likely to need five or more grade 5 and above passes and in the courses you wish to study. Entry requirements do vary though so it's important to check each college/sixth form's entry requirements.
- Entry requirements for level 1 and 2 courses are lower you will need to check individual colleges.
- A levels are level 3 courses you will choose four subjects.
- There are lots of level 3 vocational courses also such as childcare, hair and beauty and many apprenticeships.
- Level 1 and 2 courses tend to be work based courses. You can apply for level 3 courses once you have passed a level 2 course.
- Apprenticeships are usually level 2 and 3 courses.
