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Performing Arts News and Events Theatre Trips

We started the year with the first of a planned series of Performing Arts Diversity trips, with the aim of developing an understanding of our differences as individuals and celebrating our common humanity. Ms Desbenoit, Mr Ramlagan and I took a group of students from Years 10 and 11 to see *The End of Eddy* at the Unicorn Theatre; this play explored the formative experiences of French writer Edouard Louis, who grew up in a working-class macho culture, which he felt he did not belong to. This sees the continuation of our relationship with the Unicorn following the end of our three-year Explore partnership. This allows us to access discounted tickets, as well as other benefits for staff, student and parents. Ms Warren, Mr Ramlagan and Ms Bradshaw took a group of students from Years 8-11 to Theatre Royal Stratford East to see *Ballet Black* as part of our cultural celebration of Black History Month. This trip was so successful and popular that we will be investigating the possibility of more visits to see dance performances in the coming year.

We also took a group of students from all year groups to see *Porgy* and *Bess* at English National Opera. (ENO)



This is the first time ENO has staged Gershwin's masterpiece and it was many of the participating students' first experience of opera. Ms Davies, Ms Desbenoit, Ms Bradshaw, Ms Mayes and Ms Healy helped to staff this trip.

The next event was a Challenge activity for selected Year 10 GCSE Drama students; which comprised of a workshop followed by a visit to the Donmar Warehouse to see *Shakespeare's Measure for Measure*.

Tutor Groups 10 G, C and H went to the Unicorn Theatre to see *Grimm Tales*. This is a replacement for the trip that was cancelled earlier in the year.

At WSFG, it is our ambition that every child goes to the theatre at least once during their time with us. As a result, last year we initiated the Year 8 theatre trip. This year we took the Year 8s to see *Grimm Tales* at the Unicorn.

Finally at the end of term, we had another Diversity trip. We took 30 students to see *Caroline*, *or Change* in the West End. This extraordinary musical stars the amazing Sharon D Clarke.

"Revolution is in the air in 1960s' Louisiana, but civil rights seem unreachable for Caroline: an African-American maid working endlessly in the sweltering basement of the Gellman household. Amidst powerful performances, dazzling special effects and singing washing machines, the intimate relationship at the heart of this beautiful musical portrays the changing rhythms of a nation. Rehearsals are in full swing for our production of *Mary Poppins*, to be performed in the week commencing 11th February. The cast comprises around 60 students from every year group. Auditions were highly competitive and students have done extremely well to be cast. All participating students were issued with a rehearsal schedule; after school rehearsals are usually on Tuesdays and Fridays, and attendance is essential.

The Hate Play Project

The Box Clever Theatre Company visited the school to perform *The Hate Play* to the whole of Year 9. This is a theatre-in-education piece which explores the theme of bullying. A group of 30 Year 9s are helping the company to develop a sequel to the play through follow-up workshops. 20 of the group attended an open rehearsal before seeing the play; this gave us an insight into the rehearsal process – something we don't often get to see at a professional level. The remaining 10 students will be taking the ideas developed in the workshops to City Hall for an ideas-sharing session.

Office 365@WSFG

This academic year, all Year 7 students will be using Office 365 in their computing lessons to support their learning. They can use Office 365 at home and at school. Students have access to Word, PowerPoint and Excel no matter what device they are using, it could be an iPad, Chrome Book, laptop or PC.



They also have a storage area called One Drive, where they have 1000 gigabytes of storage.


One of the advantages of using Office 365 is that it will read back whatever a student has written. Students can change the background colour of the text so that it is easier to read. They can also change a setting so that the verbs, nouns adjectives and adverbs are highlighted in different colours.

Each student also has an electronic exercise book where they can take notes. These notes can include drawings, text and links to resources. There is also an area of the notebook where they can collaborate with other students and another area where the teacher can share resources.

Their teacher can set assignments using Office 365 and students can hand-in their assignments online – no more paper sheets that can get lost.

English Faculty

Last term the English faculty was busy celebrating a variety of events and competitions.

In September, we hosted a performance of 'Romeo and Juliet,' performed by Shakin Up Shakespeare. The performance focused on key scenes from the play and included a wealth of audience participation from



our Year 11 girls. Anthony Glenn from *Shakin Up Shakespeare* breathed new life into the play, highlighting both the comedy and pathos throughout his performance of this classic tragedy. Two additional workshops followed the performance, in which selected Year 11 students were encouraged to dig deeper into key moments in the play, furthering their understanding of character development, intentions, and motivations. This was an excellent opportunity for Year 11 students to develop their understanding of the play.



In addition to exciting performances within lessons, the English Faculty is also pleased to celebrate our students' success beyond the classroom. Several Year 10 students have been accepted onto the Young Reporters Scheme: Gabriela, Safa, Ying, Iris, Gulfen, Kitty, Amud and Crystal.

This year-long scheme connects aspiring journalists with professionals in the field, giving these students the opportunity to research, write, and publish their own articles for London News Quest, a digital newspaper. Our Young Reporters have begun the scheme and will be publishing their first articles in the near future.

The English Faculty also celebrated Black History Month last term. KS4 students were invited to submit their entries to the English Faculty competition: 'Remember the Ship.' Students were encouraged to read the poem 'Remember the Ship,' by John Agard, and write their own descriptive piece or poem in reaction to what they have read. KS3 students were invited to submit entries to their own Black History Month celebratory competition.

Our Year 9 students participated in 'Into Film's Youth Film Festival' with a screening of 'MazeRunner: the Death Cure' at Empire Cinemas in Walthamstow on Wednesday, 7th November. This was an excellent opportunity for Year 9 students to view their stimulus text before writing their own film review.

Year 7 students, currently studying A Christmas Carol, had an opportunity to watch a live performance of the novel in December.

Year 7 Humanities Trip to Rochester Castle and Cathedral

The Humanities Faculty took the whole of Year 7 to visit the medieval city of Rochester in Kent.

The trip was designed to improve the students' understanding of Medieval Society and what it must have been like to live in Norman Britain shortly after the invasion of William the Conqueror. This year in history lessons the students have been studying the Norman Conquest and have also been investigating castles.



Rochester has one of the best preserved castles in Europe which helps to illustrate the scale, nature and use of castles in the middle ages. The students could witness first hand the challenges of attempting to attack such a fortified structure, or conversely how you would defend your home if you were living in it.

Trips like this really help to bring the humanities curriculum to life, and help the students to appreciate the history of our country while developing empathy for the people in the past and in other countries.



We also visited Rochester Cathedral to see how religion was practiced in the middle ages, and Rochester High Street to complete a geography survey.

Overall the trip was a huge success and the students followed up the visit with some project work on Norman Society back in their humanities lessons.

Debating in the City

Last term, seven Year 10 students were given the opportunity to spend the day at a prestigious international law firm in the City called Pinsent Masons. We took part in a debate arguing against the motion that tighter regulations of drones should be enforced. Two lawyers from Pinsent Masons and one person from Tesco (Pinsent Mason's client) came into our school ahead of the event and led a debating workshop, giving us tips on how best to prepare for the debate.

As a debating team we were assigned roles: two of us opened the debate (Leila and Izzy), two questioned the opposition team (V and me), and one person closed our argument (Shanai). We also had two members of our team who researched the motion (Imaan and Tulin). Our debate was against another London school called Valentines High School. It was a really tough debate but we won our round!



The event was chaired by the Right Honorable Lord Justice Floyd and the judges included Pinsent Masons' Senior Partner Richard Foley.

We were the first to debate so once we'd finished, we watched the debates of other students representing their schools in London and learned various techniques and approaches to their debating motions, such as: 'Single use plastic should be banned' and 'Humans should fear artificial intelligence'.



Ms Jean-Baptiste and Mr Streader accompanied and supported us. As part of the visit we were also given a tour of the building itself. Together we found this experience to be a real eye-opener, exposing us to the work life of lawyers which was interesting. As a result of this trip many of us are considering taking up a career in law.

Together Walthamstow Remembers

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow between the crosses, row on row"

On Sunday 11th November Walthamstow School for Girls joined together with Eden Girls' School to honour the fallen victims of the Great War.

Ms Davies and Mr Morrow were joined by two student representatives (*Ornelda* and *Adjoa* from Year 9) to lay a wreath of poppies on the cenotaph outside the town hall.



The laying of the wreath marked the final step in the Remember Together project that both schools have been collaborating on for the past few weeks. The project was aimed at raising awareness of the contribution of Muslims, Hindus and Sikhs to the British war effort in World War One. It was also intended to celebrate the brotherhood and solidarity of these groups by creating a special wreath of poppies that would be laid at the War Memorial.



The ceremony was led by Mayor of Waltham Forest Sally Littlejohn and proved to be both a sombre and emotional service. Many of the different communities who had members that sacrificed their lives in the Great War were acknowledged in speeches made by the many guest speakers, each of whom told their own personal stories of how they remembered World War One. It was a moving and thought provoking service that left all those present deeply affected.

We would like to thank the hard work of all the staff and the students involved in the project and we look forward to continuing to raise awareness of the other groups that have been overlooked in the past.

Or in the words of John McRae:

"Take up our quarrel with the foe, to you from failing hands we throw the torch; be yours to hold it high."


