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HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents and Carers

This has certainly been a week of contrasts-we returned to school after the half term break to a blaze of sunshine. The girls spent every break relaxing outdoors; it could easily have been May or June. There is no comparison to the snow we had on this week last year, which resulted in a school closure-the very same week as our first Section 8 Ofsted inspection!

There have already been a number of exciting additional events this week. On Tuesday, Year 8 were involved in a drop-down day exploring issues around violence to women and girls. Also on Tuesday, over fifty families attended an information evening run by African Adventures and the school, designed to launch the next trip to our link school in Zanzibar in 2020. We were very pleased by the enthusiasm of our students-despite the knowledge that there would be a lot of hard work fundraising ahead.

We have also had two Year 11 art trips-see page 8 for more details and photographs of the visit.

On Thursday, a drama group visited Piccadilly Theatre to see A Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night. We are grateful to the Performing Arts faculty for organising this additional trip so soon after the magnificent whole school musical, Mary Poppins Jnr.

Finally this week, we launched our celebration of LGBT History month via assemblies. The focus this year is on Peace, Activism and Reconciliation.

Our students have been reminded about the school's Equal Opportunities policy, the origin of Stonewall and the Rainbow flag and also the horrific treatment of the British Scientist and pioneer in computing, Alan Turing, and his memorial in the Apple logo. They have also learned that being gay is still illegal in

over seventy countries worldwide, and, in a number,



is punishable by death. We all recognise that ignorance is a source of homophobia and, through education, attitudes can change.

International School Leadership Programme at the Institute of Education, University College London.

WSFG has been invited to become a placement school for this international programme. We have been selected because we are the Lead School, in the Waltham Forest GREEN Teaching School Alliance, we are 'outstanding and are a comprehensive girls' school that would give leaders a wide ranging experience in a diverse setting.

A cohort of twenty Headteachers and local leads from Saudi Arabia are taking part in this Leadership programme to improve their own practice in Saudi Arabia. This course is running from 16th January to the 1st August 2019.

WSFG will host three headteachers and local leads on Tuesdays and Thursdays for a period of six weeks and this process will be repeated three times.

Our colleagues hold important leadership positions in Saudi Arabia, with some responsible for between one and two hundred schools, they will bring new ideas and practice back to their own country. We will be providing structured opportunities to develop their understanding of the many aspects of the school such as school improvement planning, curriculum development, assessment, inclusion and pastoral care, student leadership, professional learning for teachers, initial teacher training programmes, as well as contemporary social issues, so they attend our assemblies, for example, and observe our teaching.

We are delighted to welcome our first placements this week, and look forward to working with them over time.

The Focus of the Fortnight 25th February – 8th March 2019 UNIFORM Clothing, Jewellery, Lanyards, Conduct Cards, One-Card.

Dear Parents / Carers,

The Focus of the Fortnight will be on all aspects of the school uniform. This will include clothing, jewellery, lanyards, conduct cards and one-card. It is vital that your daughter is correctly equipped for school, including wearing the correct uniform. The school has clear rules about uniform and jewellery which are detailed on page 9 of your daughter's Student Planner. The sanctions for not following the school rules are detailed below.

In addition, we are also asking that your daughter does not wear brightly coloured underwear that shows through her white school shirt as this is inappropriate for school. She must also be wearing a school skirt of a modest length and there will be a sanction applied if she is not. We expect all our students to be dressed modestly for school and if the uniform rules are followed correctly this will be the case.

Sanctions

 If a student is wearing a non-uniform item, it will be confiscated and she will be asked to change into an item of correct uniform provided by the school. The student will collect any confiscated uniform items at the end of the day from her SPL. The conduct card will be signed.



- If a student is wearing a skirt that is too short, she will be asked to adjust it but if it is still too short, she will be asked to change into an item of correct and appropriate uniform provided by the school. The conduct card will be signed.
 If a student is wearing her school skirt rolled up at the waistband to shorten it, the conduct card will be signed for a uniform infringement.
- Any items of non-uniform jewllery will be confiscated and Parents / Carers will be sent a letter asking them to collect the item just before the next half term holiday.
 (This will NOT be returned at the end of the day). The conduct card will be signed.
- If the lanyard or conduct card are not worn, there will be an automatic one hour detention that the Parents / Carers will be informed of by letter. The conduct card will be signed.
- Please see page 9 of the Student Planner for uniform and jewllery regulations at WSFG.

Blazers are COMPULSORY for Year 7, 8 and 9 students and they MUST be worn at all times in school unless permission is given by staff to remove them.

This half term the English faculty have been busy celebrating a variety of events and competitions. Year 9 have been following the 'Up for Debate' scheme of work which develops oracy and provides thought-provoking and challenging motions for pupils to debate. In addition to interesting and informative debates within lessons, the English Faculty is also pleased to announce that the following students have made it to the Year 9 debating final at WSFG: *Jessica, Rachel, Beatrix, Amanta, Saahirah, and Keira.* These students debated in an assembly before half term, the motion they were proposing or opposing was: 'This house would allow performance-enhancing drugs in sport.'

Technology is advancing so rapidly and it has changed the way we educate our young people. At WSFG this half term 7F have been trialling iPads in their English lessons and have been using them to explore non-fiction texts. They have embraced project based learning and have been busy working collaboratively to plan and create their own digital magazines! The completion deadline was Friday 15th February and Ms Simpson is looking forward to presenting the magazines to parents and carers once completed.
