The Legal Stuff

It is a requirement that all young people continue in **education or work-related training** until they are 18 years old.



What's the difference between 6th Forms and Colleges?

Sixth Form:

Typically part of a secondary school. Primarily focus on A-Levels but many also offer BTecs or International Baccalaureates. In terms of environment, sixth forms tend to be more school-like and are usually more structured. Students are 16-18 years old.

Colleges:

A separate institution. Offer a wide range of qualifications, including vocational courses. Colleges cater to students 16 and above.

The five main routes:











Each pathway will suit a different type of learner, have different entry requirements / application processes and potentially shape your child's career in different ways.





What are they?

- Level 3 courses
- Focus on academic learning in the classroom. You may do work experience but not for all subjects.
- Instead of one subject, you will study at least 3 at once.
- Allow you to progress to employment, university or an apprenticeship depending on your grades.
- Entry requirements vary but on average, you need 6+ GCSE passes with a grade 4 and above with a 5/6 in subjects you wish to study as well and English and Maths.

7-LEVELS

What are they?

- Alternative to A levels. Equivalent to 3 A levels (level 3 courses).
- Focus on classroom learning with a 45 day industry placement.
- Designed for specific industries based on your chosen subject.
- Allow you to progress to employment, university or an apprenticeship depending on your grades.
- Similar entry requirements to A-levels.



BTEC What are they?

- Business and Technology Education Council they are specialist work-related courses.
- All levels available.
- Designed for young people **interested in a particular sector** but unsure exactly what job.
- Mix classroom learning with practical and work-based experience.
- Designed for specific industries based on your chosen subject.
- Allow you to progress to **employment**, **university** or an **apprenticeship** depending on the level.
- Entry requirements are dependent on which level BTEC you study





What are they?

- Level 2 to University level courses
- Combine practical training in a job with study.
- Give the opportunity to earn while you learn.
- Focus on 80% on the job training 20% off the job training.
- Offer an **alternative** to University.
- Entry requirements vary depending on the level.





What are they?

- Level 1 courses
- A course combined with Work Experience.
- Gets you ready for work or an apprenticeship.
- Lasts for 6 weeks to 6 months.



How do I start to choose my course?


- 1. What you want to do post-18? (University?)
- 2. What are you passionate about? What about subjects you enjoy? What are you good at?
- 3. Look at the **subject library on unifrog** to explore subjects.
- 4. What are your predicted / target grades?
- 5. What do my parents/carers think?
- 6. What did the careers advisor say?
- 7. Use the **Unifrog course finder**.
- 8. Visit colleges/sixth forms/providers get as much information as you can.



Other information on applying...

- 1. You can apply to as many providers as you like
- 2. Ensure you have an **ASPIRATIONAL**, **SAFE** and **BACK-UP** option when applying to colleges/sixth forms
- 3. Colleges / sixth forms have varying application deadlines some in October and some much later in the year! All applications should give the school e-mail as collegereferences@wsfg.waltham.sch.uk
- 4. Reference requests go through Ms Dowling in G41 the colleges will apply directly to us.
- 5. You will find application forms on individual websites
- 6. There is guidance on writing a personal statement on Unifrog.

Year 11 Curriculum

- All departments have developed learning journeys an overview for each topic to help students and parents understand the main learning points in a topic
- Key assessments will be detailed on learning journeys to help students and parents know important pieces of work that will everyone understand the progress that has been made
- Students get will get home learning set by departments and this will support revision

Curriculum and assessment – How can I help my child?

- Look at your child's learning journeys with them (these are available on the school website) and talk through this alongside their work in their books and on Teams
- Make sure they use and make reference to any guidance they are given by their teachers when completing assessments
- Use the feedback in their books to help them make improvements or use this when completing later assessments.
- Inform the teacher/school of any concerns or queries early on so these can be dealt with quickly.

Motivation

Pathways - Talk with your student about where they want to go next and what is motivating them to do well


Recognition - Praise, incentives/rewards for consistency, continuous effort and focus

Time bound Know that their 'normal' life will return in a few short weeks



Revision timetable - Putting you in control

- √ Before you start your timetable, write a list of the things you need to revise for all your subjects
- √ Create a timetable that helps you to revise each of your subjects regularly - not just before the exam.
- ✓ Try to prioritise the things you have found the hardest first to give yourself longer to understand them.
- ✓ Make sure you still enjoy hobbies, free time and breaks.

- ✓ Plan in what you will be studying and when







Revision Techniques

How do I revise?

- A common concern many students have is not knowing how to revise.
- Not all topics can or should be revised in the same way.
- Using a variety of proven techniques can be very beneficial.
- By using the Year 11 Study Guide students can choose the most effective types of revision.



Revision Ground Rules: <u>A balance of consistency and accountability</u>

- Putting the hours in (2-3 hours revision everyday, including revision in school)
- In-school revision (ICT rooms open at lunch and after school)
- Attending study club (running for selected students)
- Attend Intervention/Revision sessions in school
- A quiet space to learn is crucial
- Take mindful/personal breaks

AVOID DISTRACTIONS!!!













A checklist for healthy revision living

- Enjoy a healthy and balanced diet.
- □ Use a revision timetable.
- □ Take regular short breaks (every 40-50 minutes).
- □ Plan for longer breaks every 3 hours.
- □ Take exercise get fresh air **Drink water**.
- □ Don't revise after 10 o'clock at night.
- □ Don't 'cram'
- Go to bed at a 'normal' time.
- □ Revise without access to your phone
- Revise at a desk and not on your bed
- □ Plan to follow up what you don't understand





GCSE English Literature and Language

Year 11 Mocks 2 mocks for English:

Literature (2 topics): 'Romeo and Juliet,' **Unseen Poetry**

Language Paper 2 (Non-Fiction Reading, **Transactional Writing**)

How should my daughter be revising at home?

- Timelines: make a timeline to explore the sequence of events in each literature text.
- 5-point plans: create a 5-point plan for each major character or theme in a text.
- Key quotations quiz: memorise 5-7 quotes for each major character or theme in a text.
- Quotation Analysis: annotate key quotations to explore methods & effects.
- Language (1 full paper): Pattern Finding: explore how characters or Language Paper 2 (Non- themes develop or change, or patterns in the text.
 - Overall meaning: practice writing summaries to sum up the writer's overall meaning or message in the text.

KS4 Science Tips

- Do not spend ages making notes, flash cards etc.
- Focus time on ensuring you can remember content (get someone to test you on recall)
- Spend time practicing exam questions that you can download from the AQA website along with the mark schemes. This is the best way to revise.
- Focus on the command words for questions: describe, explain, suggest etc. and ensure you are clear how to respond to them
- Use free science videos on YouTube to go over required practicals
- Learn your Physics formulae there will not be a prompt sheet in your mock or the actual GCSE exams

Science tiers of entry

- Students are expected to attain a grade 5-5 or higher to be entered for the higher tier for their summer GCSE exams
- Those below this in the November mock exams will be entered for the foundation tier.
- There will be a follow up conversation about this with parents/carers and students from a member of the Science faculty for those moving from higher to foundation tier.
- The tier of entry will be confirmed for all Y11 students when they receive their mock exam results, followed up by a letter of confirmation.

Key Information for Maths

- Sparx homework should be completed every week to 100%. This will ensure regular practice of both new and previously taught content.
- Students can use the independent learning section for revision. They have been shown how to do this, as well as other resources.
- Students **must** have working scientific calculators. The sooner they get one, the more time they have to get used to it before the exams.
- Casio fx-83GTCW is best.
- Decisions about tiers (higher or foundation) will be based on November mocks.



Attendance and Punctuality

It is vital that students have excellent Attendance.

- Below 95% attendance will mean the school will be closely monitoring.
- Below 90% may lead to prosecution.
- Holidays are NOT permitted during term time and lead to fines.



LATENESS = LOST LEARNING

(figures below are calculated over a school year)

5	Minutes late each day	3 days lost!

10 Minutes late each day 6.5 days lost!

15 Minutes late each day 10 days lost!

20 Minutes late each day 13 days lost!

30 Minutes late each day 19 days lost!
