Retaking maths and English

Young people must achieve at least grade four or equivalent in maths and English Language GCSE. If you don't manage to achieve this at the end of Year 11, you will have to keep studying these subjects until you successfully pass or you turn 18.

The type of qualification you will need to study is dependent on your GCSE grade at the end of Year 11.

If you got a grade three and will be studying full-time (540+ hours) next year, you'll need to resit the GCSE

If you got a grade three and will be studying part-time (150 - 539 hours), you can take a functional skills qualification instead of GCSE

If you got a grade two or below, you could take a functional skills qualification instead of GCSE

Applied general qualifications

Applied general qualifications are for students who want a broad study of a specific vocational area. They cover a wide range of subject areas, from applied science, business, health and social care to accountancy and horticulture. Examples include: some Pearson BTEC and some Cambridge Technical, AQA Certificate, NCFE Applied and many others.

Technical and vocational qualifications

Vocational courses provide qualifications related to a specific job e.g. carpenter, chef or beautician. The courses are practical and involve learning in real situations. Examples include Cambridge Technical, some Pearson BTEC, City and Guilds Diploma, AQA Technical, VTCT Diploma and many others.

T Levels

T Levels are level 3 courses, equivalent to three A levels. T Levels involve more classroom study than apprenticeships, which means you can experience an industry while you continue your studies. You'll spend 80 per cent of your time in the classroom and 20 per cent on a 45-day placement with an employer to give you the skills and knowledge companies look for.

A Supported Internship is a study programme specifically aimed at young people with an Education, Health & Care (EHC) Plan who want to move into employment & need extra support to do so. You will be offered a higher level of support than an apprentice. In the work place you will be offered a job.

Further education colleges (Independent Colleges)

FE colleges offer a broad range of full-time, part-time, day and evening courses for young people and adults.

Courses are offered from entry level to level 4 including ESOL, GCSEs, A levels, T levels, applied generals, apprenticeships, technical and vocational, higher education and occupational courses for adults.

Some large London colleges have more than one site.

Independent training providers

Independent training providers offer short courses, Supported Internships and they work with employers to supply the training element of apprenticeships.

School sixth forms

School sixth forms are for 16- to 19-year-olds and are attached to secondary schools. They tend to be formal as the site is often shared with younger students. They offer A level qualifications, applied generals and some sixth forms offer level 2 courses. They also offer resits in GCSE maths and English for young people who didn't achieve a grade four or above. School sixth forms tend to be smaller than most sixth form and further education colleges.



Sixth form colleges

Sixth form colleges are typically more informal than school sixth forms and they often provide a wider range of courses when compared to them too. However, they are similar to school sixth forms in the way that only students aged 16 to 19 can study. Sixth form colleges have students studying from entry level up to level 3. They offer a wide range of courses including A levels, applied generals and technical and vocational qualifications.

University Technical Colleges (UTCs) and Studio Schools

UTCs and Studio Schools are government funded schools for 14- to 19-year-olds. The aim of UTCs and Studio Schools is to provide a bridge between the worlds of education and work. Established by businesses and universities to promote sought after technical qualifications combined with the skills valued by employers they offer a similar GCSE curriculum to typical secondary schools, including English and maths, as well as their specialist subject.

All sixth forms and colleges have open events where you can visit to look around, find out more about the courses you are interested in and meet staff and current students. It is a good way to help you make the final decision about the pathway you want to take.

If you find crowds and noise overwhelming, you can contact the college and ask about quiet visits.



Student Support

All further education providers have details on their website about student services. This is the individual, team or department that can provide information and advice about a range of issues such as:

- Finding accommodation
- Which bursaries and hardship funds are available
- Specialist support e.g. counselling
- Academic support
- Mentoring and buddy networks

Overview

Highams Park Sixth Form is rated Outstanding by OFSTED (May 2024). OFSTED commented that the Sixth Form is a 'key strength of the school' and that our students have an exemplary range of opportunities on offer to them.

Our Key Stage 5 results since the academic year of 2018/19 have been excellent, both our A level and level 3 BTEC results placed Highams Park School within the top 25 per cent of post-16 education providers nationally for student progress. In 2024, we were awarded the ALPs Gold Award for Outstanding progress, and our valued added score of +0.2 is significantly above the national average.

Three key factors behind these outstanding results are firstly, the hard working and dedicated nature of the students who join our sixth form; secondly, our highly experienced teaching staff who are all specialists in their subjects; and thirdly, our purpose built sixth form facilities, that includes dedicated sixth form classrooms and three separate sixth form study areas, supporting our students in becoming independent learners.

Our extensive co-curricular programme, The Highams Park Horizons Pathway, is integral in enabling our students to expand their knowledge beyond the classroom and in supporting students in making important connections with key employers and educational institutions around the UK. This has enabled all of our students to move onto their desired destination. We are proud of our sixth form provision – not only is it



Overview

Students are either placed in our Rowan Sixth Form where they follow vocational qualifications or in the post-16 classes of our Niels Chapman Department where they continue with their studies.

Whitefield School is part of Flourish Learning Trust – a services which seek to open up the world for children and young people with SEND.

Entry Level Courses and subjects offered

Pathway 5 – Taking Off: A curriculum for post 16 pupils equipping them for future choices in work, college and independent or supported living. Young people following the Taking Off pathway will have previously followed one or more of the other pathways and teachers' planning will take account of the skills and knowledge gained by the end of Key Stage 4. The curriculum aims to help young people at Whitefield acquire skills that will be of benefit to them at the next stage of their lives, whether in employment, a further education setting or a day centre, so they will be able to access the same rights as all young people with opportunities as appropriate to their needs and interests.

The Taking Off Curriculum supports young people to:

- Enhance their communication and interaction skills through real-life and age-appropriate experiences
- Be involved in decision making regarding themselves, their school, education and plans for the future
- Form relationships with other young people and adults from a range of environments
- Enjoy their experience of post-16 education

Young people based at college or on the Whitefield site continue to develop their skills within five key areas of learning.

Communication, language and literacy – young people continue to follow the Programme of Study for the relevant pathway, with an emphasis on broadening the group of people with whom they can communicate

The World of Work – supports young people to gain the skills for paid employment or to work alongside others within their home and community.

Well-being – supports young people to keep as well physically, emotionally and mentally as is possible for them Everyday living – supports young people to lead as independent a life as is possible for them and to take responsibility for their everyday lives.

Creativity and spirituality – supports young people to express themselves and develop a sense of identity.

Overview

Project SEARCH is a supported internship programme which seeks to open up the world of paid employment for young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

Run by Flourish Learning Trust at Whipps Cross Hospital and St Bartholomew's Hospital, Project SEARCH seeks to give interns the opportunity to gain valuable work experience and develop key employability skills.

Over the course of an academic year, interns undertake three work placements in a range of clinical and non-clinical departments as porters, receptionists and assistants. They also undertake an ASDAN qualification, achieving this on completion of their internship.

Interns receive intensive, personalised learning support from exceptional mentors and job coaches who ensure they feel secure and comfortable every step of the way. This support enables interns to excel in their placements and become highly-valued team members making a meaningful contribution to their department.

With an employment success rate of over 70%, and a proven track record since 2014 of helping young people with SEND secure fulfilling and meaningful jobs, we are proud that our interns go on to gain full-time, paid employment which they have secured through competitive application processes. Our success rates are well above the current national employment figure for people with SEND in paid employment.

How and when to apply

Project SEARCH is open to anyone aged 16-24 who has or who has recently had an Education, Health and Care Plan. Interns need to be able to commit to a five-day week programme and should be able to travel independently.

16 to 19 bursary fund

There are two types of 16 to 19 bursary:

Vulnerable student bursary:

You could get a bursary worth up to £1,200, depending on your circumstances.

This group includes:

- > People in care
- > Care leavers
- > People claiming income support
- Disabled young people who receive Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living

Allowance discretionary bursary:

You could get a discretionary bursary if you need financial help but don't qualify for a vulnerable student bursary. Your education or training provider decides how much you get and what it's used for.

How is your bursary paid?

Your school, college or training provider will decide how you get your bursary. You might be: paid in full or in instalments, paid in cash, by cheque or through a bank account. You can be given things like a travel pass, free meals or books instead of money. Some providers also offer one off payments to cover study trips or travel for university interviews. Your provider will set conditions that students should meet to receive a bursary, for example, linked to behaviour or attendance and your bursary can be stopped if you break the rules.
