Christmas Fair in the LRC


Thank you everyone for supporting this event and here's a poem to celebrate!

GCSE Results 2017



On the first day of term, we celebrated the fantastic GCSE achievements of our Year 11 students with staff and the whole school. These were the first students nationally to sit the tougherand longer- English and Mathematics GCSEs, which were graded by the new extended range of 1-9, with 9 being even

higher than the A* grade. 30% of entries from all subjects at WSFG were awarded an A* or A (7-9) grade. Below are the results of some of our highest attainers, but many more made excellent progress overall. Our hard working staff, who managed to guide our students through the curriculum changes this year and ensure that these Year 11s achieved the success they deserved.

As you can see here, large numbers achieved the very highest grades at GCSE level and they have all made us and their families very proud. Below is just a sample of some who have now secured places at excellent sixth form and college provision. Students with the equivalent of 8 or more GCSEs with grade A*/A in the summer examinations:

Black History Month Celebrations





Black History Month – Identity to Me

Ella 11G performed an amazing speech in an assembly just before half term to celebrate Black History Month entitled "Identity to Me". I am so proud of her, it is reproduced below:

12% of the world's population are mixed race and I am one of them. Being the daughter of a finally non-segregated society, you would think people wouldn't ask questions, but one of the most common questions I get asked is "What are you?".

People talk to me like I'm some kind of unidentified object, or that dodgy crisp you find in a crisp packet, my reply to that question should go a bit like this: My name is Ella and I am 15 years old; my immediate heritage is Ghanaian, Caribbean, British, my mum is black and my mum is white.

But because of the unfortunate sake of common simplicity I just say I'm mixed race.

Mixed race is a totally inaccurate term used to describe the 12% of the population I belong to. We all come from the same human race; therefore there simply cannot be a mixed raced. Instead I would rather be called mixed heritage, as it is my lineage and culture that is mixed rather than my right to be human.

Another thing I have found is that, people constantly try to apply me to a certain stereotype but I'm always either too black or too white. This just proves that no matter who you are, society is always there to try and place you in a box, with a derogative, insensitive label to go with it.

There are more than 7 billion shades of melanin. So why are there only four colours we can think in Black, white, yellow and red.

Four little words we can't get out of our heads I'm not a light skin, mixed race or half caste,

For they are words that we should leave in the past,

No matter your skin colour, religion, gender, or sexual orientation,

It celebrates the contributions of an ethnic minority group,

Through stories of oppression, triumph, success and hope,

We live in a century of appreciated diversity

Where the colour of our skin is not all we aspired to be

But instead inspires and educates the people around us

Recalling memories from our lifetime and of our past

And I am very proud to say

That looking at all of you here today,

We are beautiful in every way.




Gwen 7F was the overall winner.
