Topic: World War 1 Poetry

Prior learning: Year 7 KS3 and Autumn Term 1: read and discuss an increasingly wide range of fiction and poetry including;

- A Christmas Carol, Shakespeare extracts, Windrush Child and Animal Farm.
- Identifying and discussing themes and conventions across a range of texts;
- Discuss and evaluate how authors use language, including figurative language, considering the impact on the reader.
- Writing analytically about texts using some subject terminology.
