Dear Parents and Carers.

Many congratulations to our Year 11 students who have been a credit to the school this week during their mock examinations. This year group will be the first with numerical rather than letters as grades, alongside a real increase in the rigour of the way in which these examinations will be assessed. We feel confident that they will do equally as well as previous ones with the support of our staff and parents, although, as we know, change is always a challenge initially. The 2016 GCSE results, as compared to others nationally, have confirmed the performance of our students at WSFG as amongst the best nationally for like schools (ie non selective).

All our younger students in Years 7 and 8 had a wonderful time on Monday when MyBnk staff spent the day with them on maths and money workshops. We are grateful to Ms Philippou and all our staff who set aside other arrangements for the day to make this fun and informative event happen. Meanwhile, on Tuesday evening, a number of lucky students visited the Young Vic Theatre to see ex MP Glenda Jackson play the role of King Lear in a sell-out production which has received 5 star reviews. Friday will be a very busy day at school as forty Year 9 students will be visiting the Creative Quarter event at the Victoria and Albert Museum. Student Leave During Term Time

A student's absence during term time can seriously disrupt the continuity of her learning. Not only does she miss the teaching provided on the days she is away, she is also less prepared for the lessons building on that after her return. There is a consequent risk of underachievement which we and you must seek to avoid. Therefore, the school DOES NOT authorise absence during term time for family holidays or trips abroad.

Parents or carers do not have the right to take their daughter(s) out of school for holidays and the school will only grant leave of absence in truly exceptional circumstances.

A student who is absent longer than ten days after an agreed return date, or without authorisation, can legally be removed from the school roll.

Parents or carers who take their daughters out of school without the authorisation of the Headteacher face court action and a fine.

In considering whether or not to authorise leave of absence, the school will look at each case individually, taking into account a student's overall attendance, her stage of education, (e.g. examinations), and the reason for the absence. It is very rare that any student is granted leave of absence.

Leave of Absence forms can be obtained from the school office and all requests should be submitted to our Attendance Manager **at least four weeks before the first day of requested absence**.

Arrangements for trips should NEVER be made before permission has been sought from the Headteacher.

Girls Allowed- #Safe4faith

Ms Dominique and I took seven Year 9 students to a Girls Allowed- #Safe4faith event organised by the London MET Police last week. It was a fantastic experience for the girls. The purpose of the event was to bring together young females between the ages of 14 and 25 from multi faith backgrounds, and for them to provide an insight to what their concerns, interpretations and perspectives are on police interaction. Here are their reviews:



I think the trip was really fun and cool to be a part of; they told us about their experiences before they were police officers and how they want to change the world to be a better place. The event aimed to reach out and inspire young women from multi-backgrounds.
