At WSFG, we marked Stephen Lawrence Day with a minute's silence and with a programme of activities for year 9 students, organised by Ms Jean-Baptiste. This included resources from the Anne Frank Trust. Students were absorbed in their learning as they engaged with important questions raised about systemic racism and the ways in which we can respond as a society.


Good Schools Guide

WSFG Commemorates Stephen Lawrence Day 22nd April 2021



On Thursday, 22nd April, Walthamstow School for Girls commemorated the anniversary of Stephen Lawrence, an innocent young man, full of promise, who was murdered in a racially-motivated attack. Stephen's legacy, particularly through the work of his parents, Doreen and Neville Lawrence, has been to inspire communities to challenge institutional racism and to empower young people to live their best life.

We held a one minute's silence during registration on Thursday and, throughout the week, students have had assemblies and PSHE lessons on Stephen Lawrence. Many of our students had not heard of him until this week.

Year 9 students participated in a Stephen Lawrence morning event organised by the school which included a live webinar run by the Anne Frank Trust. Here's what students had to say about their experience:

"I already knew about Stephen Lawrence and everything that happened to him but there were a lot of students in my class who didn't and, after the workshop, we could all leave the class saying we know who Stephen Lawrence is and how he brought the UK's racism to light." *Debra*, 9C

"Yesterday, I learned about Stephen Lawrence. I found it really moving how his family didn't give up on justice for their son even after many years. Because of his murder the police underwent change to get rid of the institutional racism that was prominent. This was a really big moment in British history and I'm glad I got to learn about it." *Josephine*, 9C

"We learned about Stephen Lawrence, who was unjustly murdered in 1993 by a group of white boys. He was attacked just because of the colour of his skin. We learned the timeline of events to get justice and how the memorial that was built for him was vandalised and his grave had to be relocated to another country due to its desecration. This shows me how we still have a long way to go in tackling racism in this country." *Rumana*, 9G

Message from Rachel de Souza, Children's Commissioner for England

Before Easter, we received a letter from the new Children's Commissioner for England, Rachel de Souza, asking for our help.

Her role is to speak up for children and young people across England. As the government starts to plan how to rebuild after the pandemic, she wants



children to be at heart of it. She needs our help to gather children's views and priorities for the future, so that the government takes them into account.

She has launched the <u>Childhood Commission</u>, which she describes as "a once-in-ageneration review of the future of childhood". This review will identify the barriers preventing children from reaching their full potential, put forward solutions and set ambitious goals for the country to achieve.

The first stage of this work is gathering the views, opinions and experiences of **all children**. She plans to carry out the largest ever consultation with children in England, called The Big Ask, to find out what children's concerns and aspirations about the future are. Her ambition is to reach every child – the more she hears from, the stronger this work will be.

The Big Ask was launched on Monday 19 April in the form of a short online questionnaire.

We would be very grateful if you could encourage your child to fill it in. If our school submits enough responses, we will receive a bespoke report summarising what our students have said about their aspirations, concerns and challenges for the future. This could be really useful for us to help our planning and provision going forwards.

English Shakespeare's Comedy - The Tempest.







School History



A recent letter to parents mentioning adherence to our school uniform, has allowed me to raid the school archive for items about previous school uniforms.

As you can see in the advert for Henry Taylor from 1958, the raincoats were extremely formal. I have also included articles from the 1937 edition of 'Iris', our school magazine, one describing the problem with leg wear and the other about trends in fashion.

To a School Girl a Hundred Years Hence. (Iris School Magazine, 1937).

As each spring brings new flowers into the world, flowers like those of the years before, yet always a little altered, so each generation of school girls has its own fashions, ambitions, enthusiasms and slang. In the nineteen thirties one performed handstands, wore one's hat brim turned down all round, built grasshouses beneath the elm trees by the hockey field and described most pleasant things as "ripping."

These are the details of school life that alter, but the nineties, the tens, the teens, the twenties and the forties all had their counterparts. This, then, is the spirit of the school, that each decade, each year, each day, brings its



new problems and interests, yet should it be possible for three girls, one of Miss Hewett's first young ladies, a fourth former of to-day and some fourteen year old of the year 2050, to step out of time and meet together in the entrance hall, it would not, after the first excited comparisons of clothes and surroundings, be their great differences that would surprise them, but the tremendous and amazing amount they had in common.

School Uniform 2020

School Uniform Expectations

- Dark, bottle green pleated knee length skirt or trousers in the acceptable school styles
- Dark, bottle green religious dress in plain, cotton fabric.
- Strictly no jeans style trousers, tight trousers or leggings are permitted.
- Plain white blouse with shirt collar to be worn by all. Shirts can be long sleeved or short sleeved and should be worn tucked in.
- Plain white vest top can be worn under the school shirt if necessary.
- Dark, bottle green sweater, cardigan or sweatshirt without any logo.
 No other colours of sweater, cardigan or sweatshirt are permitted.
- Plain black, white or bottle green knee socks, ankle socks or tights are to be worn at all times. No over the knee socks are permitted.
- Plain black low-heeled sensible shoes or boots. Trainers and higher heels are not permitted. Footwear must have black laces and not have an pattern, colour or branded logos.
- Plain, black coat or jacket that is suitably waterproof. Denim, leather, faux leather jackets and hoodies are not permitted to be brought onto the school premises.
- Hijabs must be plain white or dark bottle green and must be worn pinned securely.
- School blazer with WSFG logo is compulsory for all years and must be worn at all times



Uniform Extras

- ♦ Make-up, if worn, must be minimal and discreet. False eyelashes, eyelash extensions, acrylic or other types of nail extensions are not permitted.
- Students are permitted to wear one small stud in each ear (which should be no bigger than the size of a pea) and a wristwatch only. Facial piercings and visible body piercings (including tongue piercings) are not permitted. Any other jewellery items will be confiscated and will only be returned to parents / carers.
- Hair must be of a natural colour and hair of a non-natural colour is not permitted. All hair accessories must be small, discreet and plain.
- ♦ Coloured or patterned contact lenses are not permitted.
- Lanyard, SMART Card and Conduct Card must be worn at all times as uniform items.

Currently, masks are to be worn by all students, both in corridors and in classrooms, in compliance with the government guidance and the school risk assessment

Ramadan

Dear Parents/Carers

Could you please ensure that if your daughter is fasting, she does so according to the sunnah



method. That is they should have a full and nutritious breakfast (SEHRI) before keeping the fast.

Your daughter should not keep the fast if she is feeling unwell. In addition, in the rare event of feeling very ill during a fast, she should break the fast rather than allowing her condition to get worse.

As agreed by medics, fasting is not detrimental to our health and in fact it can be physically very beneficial. However, the correct method of fasting should be adhered to.
