HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents and Carers

We have welcomed our students back to the final half-term before the summer break and it has been a busy first week back.

On Monday 3rd June, the school was honoured to welcome Ruth Posner, a child in Poland at the time of the Holocaust, who came to speak to our Year 9 students as part of the Humanities Department Holocaust Education Trust Day. Both staff and students were captivated by Ruth's vivacious character and wonderful sense of humour, which not only brought her story to life but also demonstrated a running theme throughout Ruth's story – that of her desire not to be seen as a victim. Rather than focusing on the atrocities committed and actions carried out by the Nazis, Ruth discussed her personal narrative and experience including events which she herself looks back at as if they were from a film, such as when she ran away from the camp and then obtained a passport to forge a new identity!

In light of current events, with rising tensions between groups globally, Ruth used her talk to pose several philosophical questions to our Year 9 students, which stemmed from her own questioning

growing up – how did a civilised, developed country commit such atrocities and what made a group of people hate another to such an extent? These are important ideas for our students to consider if we are to prevent acts such as these and the whole day focused on exploring these issues with Year 9.





Despite Ruth's experiences however, she ended her talk not with negativity to the people still fostering such views, but by telling our students that they must accept that there will always be bad and good in the world and that there is always light in the dark. Our students have been extremely fortunate to meet Ruth, and as the last generation who may have the opportunity to meet with someone who survived the Holocaust, we are incredibly grateful that Ruth gave her time to visit WSFG.

The Humanities Department also had a busy end to the week with our annual Year 7 trip to Rochester taking place on Thursday and Friday. Students had a great time learning about the historically important town despite the rain on Friday. A full write up of the visit will be in the next edition of the Greensheet.

Finally, Ms Pratt, Assistant Headteacher has led our school assemblies this week on the topic of waste – an issue that is incredibly important to our current generation of students. It is great to see both teachers educating students, as well as, students informing their own education.

I hope all parents, carers, staff and students have a good weekend. To our Muslim community who celebrated the end of Ramadan earlier this week, I hope you had a wonderful Eid celebration, and to our Jewish community celebrating Shavuot this weekend, Chag Sameach!



I am writing to inform you that the Local Authority (LA) is consulting on a proposal relating to the High Needs Block (HNB) funding for April 2020 onwards. The HNB is the funding provided by the government for the LA to support pupils with SEND, Alternative Provision and a range of SEND services.

The consultation contains a range of proposals relating to SEND provision, largely concerning:

- Funding for special schools
- The level of support allocated to SEND advisory services
- A new model for supporting Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs)
- Plans to support pupils who are in need of Alternative Provision (AP)
- Plans to support pupils who are in need of Schools Resourced Provision (SRP)

Reason for the proposed changes

The Local Authority is required to consult annually with the Schools Forum (made up of heads, school representatives and governors from across the Borough) on financial issues relating to arrangements for pupils with SEND, in particular the places to be commissioned by the LA and the arrangements for top-up funding.

Background:

For the year 2020/21 the high needs budget given by the government to Waltham Forest will be approx. £29.5M. From this budget all special schools receive their total funding. The additional funding for EHCPs is also allocated from it, as is the funding for SEND support services, etc.

The current funding levels are based on historical decisions, and have not been reviewed for over 8 years. Given that the number of pupils requiring support has risen significantly in Waltham Forest, the system is now unsustainable based on the current levels.

Over the last few weeks, an 'Inclusion group', established by the Schools Forum, has been meeting to discuss and propose a way forward. The group has agreed the proposal as detailed in the Schools Forum report.

The proposal is that there will be 4 new funding levels - Level 1, 2, 3, and 4, (instead of the current 'letters' banding system):

Level 1 would be £5,000 Level 2 would be £15,000 Level 3 would be £21,000 Level 4 would be £43,000

These figures are on top of the funding schools already receive per child with SEND. In consultation with their schools forum, local authorities make decisions about the delegation of funds to schools, which for primary and secondary schools is on the basis of a local formula, and on the spending of funds held centrally, most of which is used for making high needs provision. These spending decisions are most effective when there is a strong partnership between the local authority and the institutions providing education.

The schools forum is one way in which partnership working can be strengthened, particularly with schools. However, local authorities should engage with all of those providing education in their area, including early years settings and post-16 institutions, as well as parents and young people, in fulfilling their statutory duties to keep the services and provision for children and young people with SEND under review, as required by the Children and Families Act 2014.

The consultation will begin on Tuesday 21st May and will be open until June 26th at 5.00pm.

Schools and governors are also being consulted on the proposals. In addition, I will meet with parents on Wednesday 22nd May, 10am-11.30am and also on Tuesday 4th June, 5.30pm-7pm, both at William Morris School, Folly Lane, Walthamstow, London E17 5NT to explain the reasons for the changes and to listen to parents' views.





The Challenges of Migration of Caribbean Women to Britain

Speaker: Dr Elaine Arnold 7:30pm Saturday 8th June 2019, Epicentre Leytonstone, E11 4LJ



The mass migration to Britain occurred without adequate preparation of the migrants & of the indigenous people. Nothing was done to help the latter to examine their stereotypical views of black people & to be less hostile to their presence. The migrants could not have anticipated the devastating effects that their experiences of broken attachments, separation & loss of all that was familiar would have upon them. Neither did they envisage the level of hostility based on prejudice & racial discrimination from every level of the communities in which they tried to settle. These experiences deepened their sense of isolation & loss & very often led to irrational behaviour. The intergenerational patterns of avoidant or disorganised attachments seem to be factors contributing to some of the current anti-social behaviour problems of many of the young people of African Caribbean origin.
