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Parent/Carer Information

On Monday, together with Ms Hennelly, I took a group of students to the Association of State Girls' Schools Student Leadership Conference held at the Ernst and Young Offices in Canary Wharf. The students were nominated for their excellent progress and participated in a range of student led workshops on the day, as well as hearing speeches from a variety of renowned women from the fields of journalism, radio, law and academia. A full review of the day will be included in next week's edition.

Back at school, it was a busy day for the PA Faculty as Ms Warren and Ms Wood continued the GCSE PE moderation, and in the afternoon our Year 9s took part in a sharing afternoon, focused around the play *Blood Brothers*.

On Tuesday, Year 8 students were joined by pupils from Highams Park School and Holy Family Catholic School for a Faraday Challenge where they developed their hands on problem solving and critical thinking skills, with their teacher Ms Healy.

On Wednesday, the Barbican Box project culminated for our Year 8 students who have been involved for months in various activities and workshops. The project ended with the final performance from the group which took place at the Barbican in Central London. It was a long and tiring day for our students, as well as their teacher Ms Landon who has supported students throughout the project, but they performed extremely well and showcased their creative work which they had developed with

professional mentors. My thanks to Ms Landon for assisting students since the project began and Ms Desbenoit for supporting students at the performance on Wednesday.

Year 11 GCSE Music Accompanied Solo Performances took place at the end of the week. On Thursday afternoon, a group of Year 10 students were taken to the Theatre Royal in Stratford to see the performance 'I Think We Are Alone', a new production by Frantic Assembly, whose work is studied as part of the GCSE course. This was an excellent opportunity to see how the techniques studied in Drama lessons are applied in professional practise. Afterschool, our student Diversity Magazine editors and contributors were taken on a trip to the Islamic Human Rights Commission by Ms Simpson and Ms Cato to help them create new material for the next edition, following the launch of their first magazine which was shared with staff and students this week. She shared her academic journey since leaving WSfG and gave examples from her current research. The week ended with five students attending Future Voices at the Leyton Orient Football Stadium, where they took part in workshops aimed to develop their creative problem solving with current issues such as anti-social behaviour. My thanks to Ms Philippou for arranging this and helping our students to have a voice in local issues.

From Friday to Saturday I will be at the annual ASCL (Association of School and College Leaders) Conference at the ICC in Birmingham. The theme this year is diverse leadership, which will explore diversity in leadership in all forms. Speakers include leading educationalists, policy makers and inspiring and informative leaders, as well as closing with comedian and mental health campaigner Ruby Wax OBE. The conference is always an excellent opportunity to share experiences with other school leaders. This year, I have no doubt that Headteachers will be very focused on sharing contingency plans in response to the current pandemic, whilst keeping their distance from one another!

Finally, congratulations to our Year 8 Netball Team who continue to excel in their matches and won with a fantastic score of 11-0 in their game against Buxton School on Wednesday. They also took part in a rally last week as you will see from Ms Warren's report inside this issue. Keep up the brilliant work and well done to all of our players!

## What should you do if you feel unwell?

#### **COVID-19 Update**

The school has been keeping students, parents/carers and staff up to date on the latest developments on the spread of COVID-19 and the school will continue to follow the advice of the government via the Department for Education and Public Health England. Following the Cobra meeting held yesterday by the Prime Minister, the school will remain open, until advised otherwise by the government. However, as the situation may change over the course of the next few weeks, staff are preparing work for students to complete at home in the event of a regional or nationwide closure of schools. It is therefore vital to ensure that the school office have the correct contact number for parents and carers, as in the event of a closure we would use our usual methods of communication to inform the school community, such as Groupcall and the school website. If you have recently changed your contact number, please inform the school office.

In light of the decision to keep schools open, you may be aware that we have provided tissues in all classrooms and that the toilets have now been opened throughout the day to allow students to wash their hands. Please remind your child to wash their hands on arrival at school and when they arrive home after school. #### Message to Parents and Carers

Although the vast majority of our students walk to school and use public transport, we understand that for some of our school community it is necessary for some of our students to be dropped off by car each morning and be picked up in the afternoon. However, we would ask that parents and carers who drive note the following:

 It is illegal to park or stop outside of the school on the yellow zig-zag lines or those extending to the crossing. It endangers the lives of our students as cars pulled up by the side of the road reduce the visibility of drivers to see when children try to cross the road.



- It is illegal to park in the pedestrianised area leading to St Mary's Church.
- We would ask that parents and carers do not drop-off at the top of Church Hill
  Road. The constant stream of cars doing a turnaround at the top of that road not
  only frustrates our neighbours but significantly adds to the poor air quality that our
  students then have to breath in during the school day.
- Please do not turn around using multi-point turns in the middle of Church Hill.
   This causes traffic to bank up and the idling and slow-moving cars add to the poor air quality in the environment of our school
- If you have no alternative but to bring your daughter to school by car, or pick her up
  from school, please arrange do it at a distance from the school and in such a way
  that does not obstruct the surrounding roads, add to congestion and add to the air
  pollution. It is far better that your child walks the short distance and gets to breath
  cleaner air during the day.
- We have also received numerous complaints about this from local residents who are themselves concerned about pollution.

For any student with a disability or serious injury that prevents them walking even a short distance, by prior arrangement it can be organised for them to be dropped off at the school entrance.

Dear Walthamstow School for Girls,

I wanted to thank you very much and give positive feedback at your article in last week's green sheet regarding encouraging girls and their families not to drive to school unless absolutely essential and not adding to pollution locally. I live very locally and my parents live just behind the school.

My dad and I have asthma that can be severe. We have both been hospitalised with asthma as emergencies in the past. After a life threatening attack I spent five days in hospital. I am very sensitive to pollution and it can trigger my asthma. My daughter, who attends your school has luckily only mild asthma but I do worry about her pollution exposure making it worse in the future, I also worry for her future and all our children's future because of the climate emergency where car pollution is a major contributor so again it is vital to encourage people to only use cars if absolutely necessary. I thought it a good idea that you offered drop off inside for children with genuine disability or injury need with prior arrangement.

I have many times witnessed multiple cars dropping and collecting girls from the school around the Church Hill area and causing a lot of chaos and unsafe road and pavement conditions.

Apart from the pollution it is sad for girls not to get the exercise and fresh air walking to school. If safety is a worry then they can walk in groups or one parent can take turns walking several girls.

We also have great bus, tube and rail transport links here if anyone has moved away from school. Something I learned is that children in cars get 50% of the car's pollution sitting in the car! They get much less walking on the pavement! So please do keep up the good work by keeping this subject in the green sheet as often as possible until people understand and change what is actually albeit probably unwittingly, but nonetheless selfish behaviour.


The week ended with a very exciting International Women's Day with lots of celebrations and more career related activities.

Our school office staff have also become involved through propagating and nurturing seedlings on windowsills in the school's front office.






