HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents and Carers

I write this on the eve of my attendance at the ASCL national conference in Birmingham from Friday to Saturday. This is a huge annual gathering of Headteachers and senior staff from schools and academies from across the country. It attracts headline speakers which include MPs, Ofsted, educationalists from the UK and abroad, and passionate changemakers such as Malala Yousufzai who addressed a previous conference and shared her offer of an Oxbridge place to study PPE, and her dream to influence the educational pathway of girls across the globe. I have no doubt that the main feature of debate this year will not be Brexit but rather the tragic underfunding of state education and the diminishing resources that we have with which to deliver the first class education that each of our children deserve.

Other events this week have been varied. Year 10 students who had not participated in either of the Oxbridge visits this year were treated to 'lecture' type presentations from colleagues from Oxford. They debated theology (via the initial stimulus of Hokusai's wave), Henry VIII and his lineage and also an animated exploration of gender. We were joined for this event by students from Willowfield and Eden Girls' School -who were accompanied by two former WSfG students, now themselves a teacher and TA at Eden. They were nostalgic about their former school but impressed by the new build.

The weather has been impressively turbulent this week. No better time, then, than choose this week to take all our Year 11 Geography students for a trip to the Essex coast, to be more precise, Walton on the Naze. Fortunately for all, the torrential rain ceased just in time! They even experienced blue skies as you can see in this issue of the Greensheet.

Thursday was a celebration of Pi Day. I am thrilled to announce that a WSFG world record was broken at lunchtime. One of our KS3 students managed to recite Pi up to over 500 digits.

This would not quite make the Guiness Book of records, currently held, I believe, by Akir Haraguchi who, in 2006, broke the world record by reciting Pi to up to 100,000 digits from memory-this took 16 hours 30 minutes.



However, since our record breaking event was constrained by our lunch breakwho knows what we could have accomplished if pm registration and period 4 was not looming! See page 10 for full report.


Year 8 Parent Evening Thursday 21st March 4.30-7.00pm

Parent/ Carer Information student leave during term time

A student's absence during term time can seriously disrupt the continuity of her learning. Not only does she miss the teaching provided on the days she is away, she is also less prepared for the lessons building on that after her return. There is a consequent risk of underachievement which we and you must seek to avoid. Therefore, the school DOES NOT authorise absence during term time for family holidays or trips abroad.

Parents or carers do not have the right to take their children out of school for holidays and the school will only grant leave of absence in truly exceptional circumstances.

A student who is absent longer than ten days after an agreed return date, or without authorisation, can legally be removed from the school roll.

Parents or carers who take their daughters out of school without the authorisation of the Headteacher face court action and a fine.

In considering whether or not to authorise leave of absence, the school will look at each case individually, taking into account a student's overall attendance, her stage of education, (e.g. examinations), and the reason for the absence. It is very rare that any student is granted leave of absence.

Leave of Absence forms can be obtained from the school office and all requests should be submitted to our Attendance Manager **at least four weeks before the first day of requested absence**.

Arrangements for trips should NEVER be made before permission has been granted by the Headteacher.

Focus of the Fortnight 18th – 29th March 2019 Banned Items

Dear Parents/Carers,

Please see page 5 of your daughter's planner for clarification of the items that are banned at WSFG. (See list below).

If a student is found to have a banned item in school, it will be confiscated and her conduct card will be signed. If and when appropriate Parents / carers will be contacted and will be asked to collect the item.

PLEASE NOTE - if your daughter has her mobile phone confiscated, she is **NOT** automatically entitled to have it back the next day. The school rule is that the phone will be returned to the Parent/Carer the week before the next school holiday. Parents/Carers will receive a letter asking them to collect the mobile phone from the school office on a given date. If Parents/ Carers wish to speak with the school about the confiscation of a mobile phone, please telephone the school and ask for Ms. Pratt. Please do **NOT** come into school and ask the phone to be returned unless an arrangement has been made with Ms. Pratt for it's collection. We do have arrangements for mobile phones to be handed in at the office at 8.30 for safekeeping during the school day as they are **NOT** allowed to be carried in school from 8.45 – 3.30pm.

In order to support your daughter and the school with this Focus, please ensure she is clear about the banned items at WSFG.

Sanctions

- If the item is dangerous, further sanctions will be taken according to the School Positive Behaviour for Learning Policy.
- Banned items are as follows:- Illegal items, dangerous items, mobile phones, all electrical items, chewing gum, aerosols, liquid paper, glass bottles and non-uniform items, such as hoodies.



Congratulations to everyone who took part and thank you to Year 7 student, *Stella* who filmed the event.




In second place was *Isra* 7S who achieved 202dp, closely followed by *Aaminah* 7F who achieved 201dp.

Mathletes Competition at Monoux





Any pupil aged 11+ who is interested in music can attend. For info/booking go to:


