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HEADTEACHER'S MESSAGE

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Dear Parents and Carers

The school's three badminton teams have finished the final week of the Spring Term with great success at the Borough Badminton Competition. Over 150 students attended the trials held by Ms Wood in the last week of March, hoping to win one of the four places on offer in our school badminton team. Ms Wood was so astonished by the turn out and ability of those who attended, she decided to take three teams to the competition. Congratulations to our under-16s team which came 1st, our under-14s team which came 2nd and our second under-16s team which came 4th. Well done to all and thank you to Ms Wood for organising our participation.

Our Year 9 students were fortunate enough to be involved with two visits this week, arranged by Transport For London (TFL) and Framestore. On Thursday, Year 9 students took part in a workshop organised by TFL, called the 'Guardians Project' which is a new campaign highlighting the importance of reporting unwanted behaviour on public transport. It is so important that we equip our students with the awareness and confidence to report instances of harassment and this extends to our students outside of school, particularly when using public transport. I have no doubt that you would also support this initiative.

On Friday, 30 Year 9 students visited the Framestore, along with Ms Phillipou and Ms Careless. Framestore is a renowned visual effects company, known globally for creating images and scenes for Hollywood films, such as the recent sequel 'Blade Runner 2049'. This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to gain experience, not only of the creative industries, but also of a large global firm. My thanks to Ms Phillipou for organising the visit.

Some of our Year 7 and 8 students also had a fun last day of term, as the STEM/Gardening Club were taken to Organiclea Community Growers Farm, a community food project based in the Lea Valley. This was the first part of the students' project, with the second part consisting of a soil scientist workshop which will take place in May. I am grateful to Ms Dominique and Ms Healy for arranging the visit to this workers' cooperative. Our young people take such an active interest in sustainability and producing their own food. Others have actively linked this term with young people elsewhere in highlighting the crisis to our planet caused by climate change.

I know many of you will have been entertained once more by the superb playing of our steel pan ensembles at the concert on Thursday evening. The girls put in hundreds of hours of practice to attain such high standards. Our thanks, as ever, go to Mr Murphy, who directs and orchestrates the bands and Ms Bradshaw, our Head of Music and the rest of our Performing Arts Faculty.

Following on from last week, I would also like to remind Year 11 students of the supervised revision opportunities available at school during the Easter Break ahead of exams taking place when we return. The school will be open to students in Year 11 for private revision over the Easter holidays from Monday to Thursday both weeks. Students **must arrive between 9:30am and 9:45am** and can leave at any point. The session will finish at 12:30pm. Students will have access to computers and will be supervised by a member of the Leadership Team each day. Students also have the option to use George Monoux College library which is open every day until 7pm for private revision for WSFG students.

Finally, I would like to wish all students, parents and staff a wonderful Easter Break, and for those observing Lent, I hope you enjoy your celebrations at Easter. Also Pesach Sameach to members of our Jewish community.

INTRODUCTION BUILDING HOPE FOR THE FUTURE



The 22 April 2018 marked the 25th Anniversary of the senseless murder of my son, Stephen Lawrence, a young man who had a bright future

ahead of him. At the memorial service to celebrate his life, the Prime Minister Theresa May announced the Annual National Day of Remembrance and Commemoration of Stephen which is to be held on 22 April. I warmly invite you and your school community to use the memory of Stephen's life and legacy as an opportunity for influencing the lives of the children and young people in your care.

Stephen's story is both challenging and inspirational. I wish for Stephen's name not to be identified just by his murder but by the mark he has left on this country and the wider world and for the role model he was and continues to be.

The lessons of fairness and respect must start early if we are to have a truly fair and civilised society, free from discrimination where we all play our part as active citizens. It is my belief that these values are strongest when anchored and embedded into a school's culture and explicitly taught through the curriculum. Whether you are in an Early Years, primary, secondary, special, sixth form or other school setting or in an urban or rural location, my vision is that Stephen's Annual National Day will serve as a focus for your school community to engage in activities that empower young people to **live their best life**. Through these activities, my hope is that all pupils will value cultural diversity and develop the skills and confidence to challenge racism and discrimination and to embrace inclusion.

Stephen's death and the subsequent investigation by the police revealed aspects of our country about which we cannot be proud. Against a backdrop of loss and grief I have worked to highlight injustice which resulted in significant changes to the law in Stephen's name and memory. Stephen's Day is supported by all political parties: it is intended to challenge the very way we think about and understand race and diversity.

Stephen's life story, short though it was, provides a positive role model of a life well lived. He was a normal young person who made the most of everyday opportunities. He particularly loved drawing, running and had dreams and aspirations of becoming an architect. Because of Stephen's interests, we are privileged to be partners with Virgin Money London Marathon and The Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA). These positive aspects of Stephen's story can inspire children and young people of all ages to **live their best life** and are an equally important part of Stephen's legacy.

An Australian cartoonist reimagined New Zealand's national floral emblem in memory of the Muslims slain in **the mass shootings** at two mosques in Christchurch.

The country's Silver Fern here represents each person killed by the gunman.

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Our school community was deeply moved by the events.
