Headteacher's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

We are at the end of yet another intensive, action packed and successful year for WSFG. Our Year 10 students are back with us following their experience of the world of work and they have also now received their Year 10 mock GCSE examination results. These will have galvanised them into what will undoubtedly be a very focused final year with us when they return in September

Even into the last week of term, our trips and activities continue. At the weekend, our Duke of Edinburgh students successfully completed a qualifying residential camping expedition in the blazing sunshine. We are grateful to our staff, led by Ms Black, who gave up their own time to make this happen. Year 8 public speakers excelled on Monday and were confident enough to address the whole year group. Congratulations to all the form representatives and a special 'well done' to *Mominah*, 8G, who was the overall winner. On Monday we also had a KS3 trip to the Old Vic to see *A Monster Calls*. On Wednesday we held our annual Sports Day at the Feel Good Centre and, for once, we had excellent weather to enable the girls to break more school records. Meanwhile, our intrepid Year 10 travellers returned to the UK on Thursday evening after a trip of a lifetime to Zanzibar. We are grateful to Ms Phillippou and Ms Desbenoit for accompanying the group. This has been without doubt one of the most physically and emotionally challenging trips the school has undertaken (apart from being evacuated during the Second World War to Wellingborough).

These are only some of the many reasons that we are so proud of our school, and confirm in me the sense of privilege I feel in leading a school with such great students, and such a committed and hard-working workforce and supportive community of parents and carers. Indeed, it was very pleasing to have this confirmed recently by Ofsted.

Please do enjoy the snapshot of a selection of our school events which we have captured in this issue. I am sure you will sense the spirit of optimism, joy and pride of the girls in all the photographs. This is certainly our experience as teachers. A visiting teacher to the school once told me that she could not believe the high number of activities and trips which are organised here. She added that the other schools she visited were starting to wind down, but at WSFG it appeared to be the total opposite! The Ofsted inspectors made a similar observation about our extra-curricular provision:

The breadth of pupil's experience, supported by an extensive extra-curricular programme, prepares pupils very well for life in modern Britain.

I would like to thank you all for your unstinting support of your daughter's school this year and to thank our staff and our students for all their hard work. Finally, on behalf of the school governors, our staff and myself, I wish you all a safe and happy summer holiday.

40 Years of Steel Pans at WSFG

The evening to celebrate 40 years of steel pans at WSFG was a fantastic event.

It was organised by tutor Richard Murphy, with the help of the Alumnae Committee.



Richard has taught steel pans to students at WSFG for the past 34 years, including several generations of the same families.

The funds raised will be used to tune, repair and replace the school's steel pans, a popular musical instrument among our students. It also succeeded in raising in the region of £2800 to help maintain the pans.



Over the years, the school's steel bands have grown in size and reputation, performing locally, nationally at the Royal Albert Hall, NEC Birmingham and internationally in Prague, Paris and Barcelona.



The senior bands, made up of students in Years 10 and 11, have reached the finals of the National Music for Youth Festival several times. A number of girls have gone on to study music at university and some now teach the steel pans.

The concert's programme included performances of works by Paul McCartney, Burt Bacharach, Zack Laurence and Frederick Chopin. The last piece, Toco Band by Trinidadian Aldwyn Roberts, brought the entire audience to its feet in a spontaneous ovation.



Richard Murphy praised his students, past and present, and the audience and players cheered this very special teacher as he was presented with flowers and other gifts.

Diversity workshops review:



Year 8 students were invited to participate in a one hour Diversity workshop in June. The aim of the workshop was to give our students an opportunity to engage with issues around sexual orientation and gender identity in a safe and open environment. 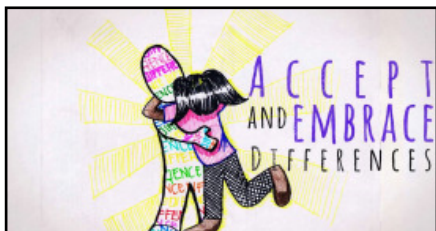

The new Year 7 Committee has worked hard to organise the events and a proportion of the money raised will be donated to a charity to help save bees. Here is some feedback from the students who were involved:

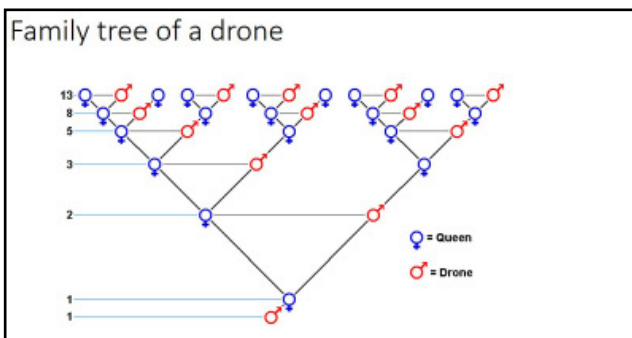

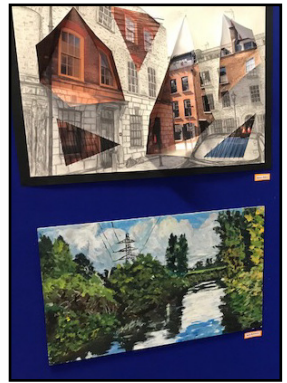

We have missed him, as we knew we would, but we have soldiered on and Ms Bradshaw has been a wonderful addition to the faculty. Looking back on the last year makes me realise how busy we have been as we strive to fulfil our aim to provide our students with as broad and rich an experience of Drama, Music, Dance and Sport as we possibly can.

Drama

Autumn Term

We began the year with a visit to Regent's Park Open Air Theatre to see *Jesus Christ, Superstar*. The production was excellent, but the curse of the British weather struck again, and we were caught in a downpour. This made for a long and damp evening!

Meanwhile, back at school, we were rehearsing for our production of *The Tempest* as part of the Shakespeare Schools Festival. A cast of Year 8s and 9s took to the Stratford Circus stage in what was described as a 'dramatic, dream-like and dazzling' performance.



Ms Wallace and I co-directed the production, and we were very proud of our company. Happily, we were successful again in our application to be part of Old Vic Schools Club. Twenty four theatre enthusiasts in Year 9 embarked on their first experience of the club by participating in a workshop and going to see *Girl from the North Country*. This was a fantastic start, and the show went on to win Olivier awards. As a Bob Dylan fan, I was thrilled to hear some of his more ropy material rendered exquisitely beautiful by the amazing cast of actor-musicians.

We also entered the final year of our three year Explore partnership with the Unicorn Theatre. The current Year 9 have been to see two productions a year, each one accompanied by a workshop, for each year of Key Stage 3. Our first production of the year was *Beowulf*, a one-woman version of the epic poem.

As a result of the experience with the Explore Partnership, we decided that it was important to ensure that all WSFG students have the opportunity to go the theatre during their time with us. In November, we took Year 8 to see *The Lorax* at the Old Vic, an exuberant, colourful production that was enjoyed by staff and students alike. It was such a success that the Year 8 theatre trip is something we intend to run every year.

For our Year 10 Drama students, we ran two trips. One was to see *Girls* at the pop-up theatre in the Town Square as part of the Hightide Festival in Walthamstow. The other was to see Ibsen's *The Lady from the Sea* at the Donmar Warehouse. Both plays explored serious issues in very different ways and provided much food for thought.

Our final theatre trip of the term was the second Old Vic Schools Club visit, when we saw *A Christmas Carol*, a splendid festive treat.

Spring Term

Our focus was on our GCSE students, as both Year 10s and Year 11s prepared for important practical exams. However, we still ran a number of trips. In January, a group of staff and students went to see Cirque de Soleil's spectacular show *Ovo* at the Royal Albert Hall. We returned to the Donmar Warehouse, again with Year 10 students, to see the searing relationship drama *Belleville*. The Old Vic Schools Club students went to see *Fanny and Alexander* and Year 10 Drama GCSE students saw *Beginners* at the Unicorn.

Our final Unicorn Explore visit was to see a modern version of Othello. Sadly, 9G, C and H were unable to see the production because of snow. Happily, the theatre has given us tickets to another show instead, and the students will be visiting the Unicorn for their final trip in November.

Summer Term

With our Year 11 students completing the practical Unit 2 exam: performing from a text. To prepare for this, we invited parents in to see the work. The standard of the performances was very high. Many of the students had worked incredibly hard during the rehearsal process, and it showed. Meanwhile, Year 10s were busy rehearsing and polishing their Unit 1 devised pieces. Again, Ms Wallace and I were very pleased with the standard of the work when the plays were performed to an audience of parents and friends.

Our final Old Vic Schools Club workshop and theatre visit to see new play *Mood Music* took place and Year 10 Drama students went to Southwark Playhouse to see their set text *DNA* in performance. Later in May, the Year 11 students sat the Drama GCSE written exam. The questions were not quite what we had expected but the students seemed to cope admirably with this. We will all be nervous come August 23rd!

With the departure of Year 11s and Year 10s sitting mock exams and on work experience, we have been preparing our Year 9 students for the GCSE they are about to embark on. We have had record uptake, with 50 students opting to study Drama at GCSE. We have been to see the Kneehigh production of *Brief Encounter* and students have been split into two groups to see either *A New and Better You at the Yard* Theatre in Hackney or *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* at the Donmar Warehouse. Both shows are preceded by a two-hour workshop with facilitators from the theatres.

Meanwhile, local all-female company Flock Ensemble came to school to perform their devised piece *This is a Blizzard* to the whole of Year 9. Unfortunately, it was the

hottest day of the year so far and the Norris Hall was like a sauna! The play was created in response to the #Metoo movement, it stimulated some very interesting discussions. We found the Q&A session afterwards with the director and cast very helpful. Our Year 9s are very experienced theatre-goers now!

Four of the Old Vic Schools Club members will be going to a Behind the Scenes day at the theatre's workrooms in Bermondsey. This involves workshops in puppetry, design and directing and should be an excellent experience.

Our final trip of the year will be to see ***A Monster Calls*** at the Young Vic. Ms Mayes, Mr Capps and I will be taking 30 Year 7s to see this production by the superb director Sally Cookson. I can't wait!

Ms Wallace has been running Drama Club for Year 7s, and I have been running one for 8s and 9s. We are planning to hold a performance next term to celebrate the centenary of some women being given the vote for the first time. Year 7s are devising a piece, whilst 8s and 9s are rehearsing two suffrage plays written for the Actresses' Franchise League between 1908 and 1914.

Also lined up for next term is a project with Box Clever Theatre Company and their production of ***The Hate Play*** about bullying. Year 9s will be seeing this, and a focus group will be helping to develop a sequel.

We will be continuing our association with the Unicorn theatre, and have joined their Schools' Club scheme. This will give our school community access to discounted tickets, extra free tickets for accompanying staff and parents and even free coffee for teachers! Ms Desbenoit and I will be taking a Year 11 Diversity trip to see ***The End of Eddy*** in September. The Year 8 theatre trip will take place in early December; the whole year group will go to see ***Grimm Tales***, as will 9 G,C,H to make up for missing ***Othello***. In November, we will return to the Donmar Warehouse to see a gender fluid production of ***Measure for Measure***; this will be open to all interested KS4 students and not just Drama GCSE students.

In a welcome development for East London theatre-goers, Nadia Fall, the new artistic director of Theatre Royal, Stratford East, has announced an exciting new season. We have already booked tickets to see ***Ballet Black*** in October for Black History Month, and for ***The Unreturning*** for our Year 10 Drama GCSE students in January.

And the biggest news of all is that our biennial whole-school musical will be performed in February. I can confirm the show will be ***Mary Poppins***, and we are hoping to involve students across the year groups on stage and behind the scenes and to see many of you at the performances.

Thank you to all those staff who have helped on our various events. They have come from all parts of the school: we couldn't run our trips without their help.

A special thank you to Mr Monkfield, who is retiring. He has been a true friend to the Performing Arts Faculty, making props for many productions, including Prospero's staff.

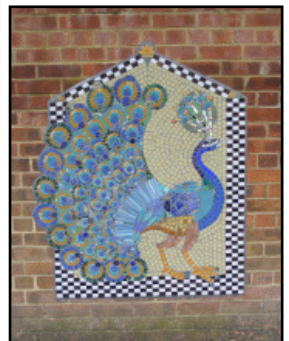
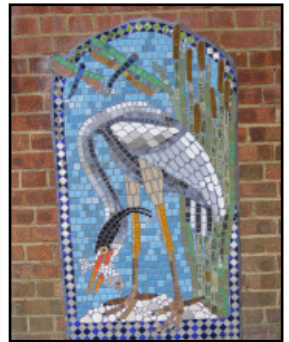
Mosaic Workshop
