Girls like Maths (and Physics!) Summer School

Four of our students from year 10 had the opportunity this July to attend King's College London Mathematics School which aims to be a centre of excellence for the teaching and learning of mathematics, and to provide opportunities for students with an interest and aptitude for mathematics, especially to those from backgrounds currently under-represented in the mathematical sciences.

Mathematics is for everyone, the 'Girls like Maths (and Physics!)' Summer School unites 160 female-identifying year 10 students as they explore the wonderful world of the mathematical sciences. Over the course of four days, they explored exciting and new ideas outside of the traditional school curriculum, completed fun experiments, took an inspiring trip, listened to female speakers in the field, and practised their problem solving.

I really enjoyed the four-day summer school at King's college for Girls that love maths and physics. It was really interesting to learn new topics and it gave us an insight into what maths is like in college. Although I missed the first day, I still had the opportunity to learn about neutrinos, the smallest subatomic particles, and learnt how to calculate how many were passing through my finger per second. I also learnt about graph theory and was able to improve my probability skills. My favourite part was the trip to the Royal Observatory in Greenwich, where I got to stand on the Prime Meridian. Overall, the summer school was a great new experience.


Congratulations also to Ayanna (7F), Martha (7S), and Umara (7F) for their structure, which won the prize for 'Most Creative'.

1. Mental Stimulation - The brain is a muscle which needs exercise to keep it strong and healthy, so the phrase "use it or lose it" is apt when it comes to your mind.

2. Stress Reduction - <u>Stress</u> slips away when you lose yourself in a great story.

Knowledge - Everything you read fills your head with new bits of information. The more knowledge you have, the better-equipped you are to tackle any challenge you'll ever face.
 Vocabulary Expansion - The more words you read, will lead you to use them in your everyday speech. Being articulate and well-spoken helps you to speak with self-confidence and increase your self-esteem.

5. Memory Improvement - When reading a book, you have to remember characters, their backgrounds, ambitions, history and sub-plots. <u>Every new memory you create forges new</u> <u>synapses (brain pathways)</u> and strengthens existing ones, which assists in short-term <u>memory</u> recall.

9. Tranquility - Relaxing with a book, creates a feeling of inner peace and tranquility.

10. Free Entertainment - You do not have to buy books, for low-budget entertainment, you can visit your **school or** <u>local library</u> and it is free.

Focus of the Fortnight - Uniform, Jewellery and Lanyards

6th – 22nd September The focus will be on UNIFORM, jewellery and lanyards You must wear your blazer and lanyard at all times (unless told otherwise). Uniform and jewellery

- You are allowed to wear one small stud earring in each ear
- You are allowed to have one small nose stud piercing
- NO other jewellery items are allowed
- Black hijabs can now be worn
- Hair can be of any colour
- Your watch can be a "fitbit" type watch but internet enabled watches are NOT allowed to be worn in school.

Sanctions to be applied

- If a student is wearing a non-uniform item, it will be confiscated and they will be asked to change into correct uniform provided by the school.
- They will collect the non-uniform item at the end of the day.

• Non-uniform jewellery will be confiscated and Parents / Carers will be sent a letter asking them to collect the item before the next school holiday.

Incorrect uniform such as no blazer, non-school shoes or no lanyard will incur a school sanction of two warnings that will then culminate in a detention on the third occasion.

Parent/Carer Governor Vacancy

Dear Parents and Carers,

Walthamstow School for Girls has a vacancy for a parent or carer to serve as a school governor. I hope you will consider putting yourself forward. The Governing Body's role is the strategic and financial oversight of the school and ensuring that students receive a high quality education which prepares them for the next stage of their education. This includes planning for future development and improvements, but not the day-to-day management of the school. For more information on school governance, please see the Governing Body section of the school website.

If you would like to stand as a candidate, please complete the reply slip below and return it to the school no later than **12 noon on Monday 25th September 2023.** If there is more than one candidate for the vacancy, an election will need to be held, but this is a straightforward process. All you need to do is write a short paragraph (no more than one hundred words) saying why you would like to become a Parent Governor. Your statement will be sent out to all parents and carers along with a voting paper. Should only one parent or carer apply, then they will automatically become Parent Governor. The term of office is four years.

The work of our governors is very important to the in key areas such as oversight and development of the ethos and curriculum of the school; well-being of pupils; staff employment and use of resources, as well as ensuring that the school maintains its high standards in all areas. You will be expected to attend an evening meeting of the Governing Body once or twice per term and to join one of its committees which also meet once a term. Governors are also encouraged to visit the school during the day by arrangement and help in the oversight of an area of the curriculum, or other important areas such as safeguarding, as a link governor. We are not looking for any particular expertise, but rather a strong commitment to the school and its students, the inquisitiveness to question and a willingness to give some of your time to governance. However, if you have specialist knowledge or relevant experience, please do mention this in your statement. Induction training is provided for all new governors and governors are expected to attend further training on specific areas of school governance paid for by the school.

As a school, we are always mindful that the Governing Body should reflect the local community that the school serves, and members of ethnic minority groups are therefore particularly welcome on the Governing Body and we would encourage you to stand for election as parent governors.

Those parents and carers who applied for the vacancy last academic year, and are still interested in becoming a school governor, are very welcome to submit their statements again. Please note that for the purpose of safeguarding, school governors are subject to an enhanced DBS check, administered via the school, which requires disclosure of any previous criminal convictions. Anything disclosed will not necessarily bar you from holding office and will be considered on a case-by-case basis by the school.

We aim to send text messages to parents and carers, although there are sometimes delays in getting these messages through promptly, so please check the school's website for up to date information.

Please ensure that the School Office has on record up to date addresses and telephone numbers, including a mobile number and the person to contact in the case of a student emergency.

It is essential that the school has at least **one** land line and a mobile number.

Blazers

All students need to wear blazers at all times. You must come through the school gates at the start of the day wearing your blazer. If you are not wearing it you will be asked to put it on by the member of SLT on gate duty or the Head of Faculty on late gate.

Blazers must always be worn whilst moving around the building. If you are hot in a classroom and would like to remove your blazer you should ask permission from the member of staff delivering the lesson before doing so. If you are leaving the classroom for any reason you need to put your blazer on.

At the end of each lesson your teacher will check everyone has their blazer on before dismissing you.

If you are not wearing your blazer around the building you will receive a behaviour point. If you forget your blazer and leave it at home you will also receive a behaviour point.

Mobile Phones

Dear Parent/Carers,

At WSfG we are aware that a number of you require your children to carry a mobile phone when on the journey to and from school for safety. To this end the school makes provision for your child to secure her mobile phone in the school office at the start of the day and collect it at the end of the day.

Children are NOT allowed to carry their phones with them during the school day and if they do, they run the risk of it being confiscated if it is seen or heard.

The confiscation period lasts for 48 hours and during that time you will be contacted by the school office to make arrangements to collect the phone from school.

Please make it clear to your child that they cannot keep their phone on their person during the school day and that if it is confiscated it inconveniences you as the family in a number of ways. Thank you for your support

iPads

It has come to our attention that some students are bringing their own iPads into school. This is a potential safeguarding concern. Please be aware that if we find students using their own iPads, they will be confiscated for 48 hours and parents will be asked to collect, as we do with mobile phones.

Student Detentions

This year the late detentions and uniform/chewing gum detentions will take place during a Wednesday lunchtime. Tutors will read out the detention list during registration on Monday or Tuesday morning. Students will also receive a reminder note on Wednesday morning. Pupil Premium and Free School Meals

Dear parents/carers

Pupil Premium and Free School Meals

If your child is eligible for 'free school meals' and you register them for this, our school will receive extra funding called 'pupil premium'. We use this extra money to improve the educational provision and resources at the school.

What is pupil premium funding?

Pupil premium funding from the government is given to schools to help students reach their full potential, regardless of their background or financial situation. It's provided for students who:

- are registered for free school meals; or
- have been registered for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years; or
- are, or have been, in care; or
- have parents in the armed forces.

At Walthamstow School for Girls we get an extra £985 for every eligible pupil who is registered for free school meals. This extra money could make a real difference to the quality of education we offer.

For example, we've previously used pupil premium funding for:

- Educational provision/resources
- Academic interventions
- Wellbeing and self-esteem building interventions

Is my child eligible for free school meals?

Your child might be eligible if you access:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance or Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on
- Universal Credit, provided you have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (£616.67 per month)

Your child might also be eligible if you're in a household with no recourse to public funds (NRPF), subject to a maximum income threshold. This is for children of:

Zambrano and Chen carers (non-EEA nationals caring for a British citizen residing in the UK)

- British National (Overseas) passport holders
- Spousal visa, work visa, or student visa holders
- Those with no immigration status
- Families with a right to remain in the UK under Article 8 of the European Convention of Human Rights
- Families receiving support under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989 who are subject to a no recourse to public funds restriction
- Certain failed asylum seekers supported under Section 4 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Does my child have to eat the free school meals?

No. Students who are registered for free school meals don't have to eat them. If you're eligible but you want your child to have packed lunches you should still register because the school will receive the funding which can support your child in other ways.

How do I register?

You only need to register once at the school.


